A curious maritime disaster is reported from Malasaguas, near the Colorado reefs, upon which the Christobal Colon recently met with disasters, and where other disasters to shipping have recently occurred. The coasting steamer Triton being in danger of going ashore on the reefs during the recent cyclone, was sunk by her commander, and after the gale was pumped out and floated. One of the officers of the wrecked Spanish cruiser Christobal has arrived here from Mantua on board the steamer Pravino.
