New York, Jan. 22.-The World, this morning, prints the following special despatch from Caracas, Venezuela: The effigy of Lord Salisbury was prepared and carried through the streets last night: the procession stopped at the plaza, where a mock trial was held. The effigy was sentenced to death and shot by the excited people, who pulled the clothing from the figure and tore it into pieces, which were distributed among the crowd.
