INTERVIEW WITH THE POSTMASTER ON THE SUBJECT.

The negotiations in progress—What Civil Service Head Thinks of the Civil Exemption—Poorly Paid Government Employees.

Saying references made to the establishment of a postal post between England and Canada, and hearing parties interested in trans-Atlantic matters talking of it. The World yesterday interviewed Postmaster Patterson and asked whether he had seen the allusion in the Mail newspaper.

"No," said the postmaster. "But it is true, I know, that negotiations have been in progress for some time, with a view to the establishment of a postal post between England and Canada, and Sir Alexander Campbell, the postmaster-general, is anxious to bring them to a satisfactory termination. And I think he will be successful," added the postmaster.

"Do you know of your own knowledge that there is a public demand for this improvement?" asked our reporter.

"Solemn a week passes without somebody being called upon to pass letter rates here, and, if this besides, upon a parcel posted in England by a friend who presumed that a parcel post would be in force between the two countries. There generally comes round to my room to air his or her grievance. It would, no doubt, be an important family having representatives on both sides of the Atlantic. I have brought it under the notice of the department frequently, and years ago used to remonstrate with the master in the green; but nothing has yet been done of it. It has been a hobby of mine ever since I came to live here."

"What are the difficulties?"

"Shadowy, I think. The apprehensions for me are that the cost of carrying it in this office by a private office would be at the chancery house, and the duty collected before delivery. The chief difficulty, probably, is the immense inland distances that those parcels would have to be carried for a trifling rate."

"The ocean steamer and the railway would demand an increased subsidy. I suppose."

"No doubt they would try for it; but the matter does not come at all within the scope of my official duties or knowledge. From personal observation and experience I know that a parcel is badly wanted, and I can see no insuperable difficulties. They have parcels posted between India and England."

"Na. But of course this is all known well enough at Ottawa."

"What is the difference between the services allowed to post in Canada and in England?"

"In England the limit is, length and girth combined, 5 feet, weight 7 lbs. Here the maximum weight is 5 lbs, length 2 feet, 6 inches. But in any Anglo-Canadian parcel post system the former would probably be not only far under the English maximum but under ours. In England the average distance a postal parcel has to travel would not easily think, exceed 100 miles. Here it would easily exceed 100 miles. Now, we could not afford to pay the postage on the limits of weight and size in Canada."

"On the whole, then, you think parcels post into Great Britain is likely to be admitted?"

"I can't say why it should not, but I have no official knowledge of the negotiations."

As the World retired, after thanking the P. M., Mr. Patterson called after him to ask why The World was pinching into the subject of dominion salaries from municipal taxation. He said it was impossible to defend the exemption, the P. M. admitted that it was based on no good or fair business principles—but said his department would not give up the cause in question, when it considered the heads of the civil service on whom the taxation would fall—most surely are the worst men in the country. I have no end of correspondence and interviews, to preserve discipline among 120 men responsible for an immense sum of cash handled in the money-order and savings bank offices, and am paid \$8000. The salary of a private secretary would be \$15,000 to \$30,000 per annum. And it is equally true that cheaper substitutes could be found. I could give you a dozen instances in the city. Officers' salaries are low enough without being docked, but the exemption is indefensible on any other ground, though I know the specious allegations brought forward by the civil service petitioners against alteration of the act.
