in Toronto which are of great benefit to those who need help. Among others may be mentioned the House of Industry in Elm-street, where several gallons of soup are served out daily to all regardless of nationality or creed. The Board of the House has divided the city into districts, each of which is under the care of a visitor, who personally visits the abode of every applicant for relief, and according to his recommendation the board grants bread and fuel pro rata to each family. In cases of sickness small grants of groceries are made. The design of the board is to help the poor without making them paupers. The visitors go among the recipients of their districts weekly and distribute bread tickets, etc., and give such advice as may be deemed necessary. There is no remuneration for any visitor. Theirs is purely a labor of love. The following is a brief summary of one day's visitation in one district:

At the meering of the Night School Committee of the Public School Board, held yes, terday afterneon, Dr. Gullen and Messrs. R. U. McPherson, E. P. Roden and E. O. Weston, chairman, were present. The reports were gone into, and with the exception of a few items were passed.

The chairman was authorized to close any class that averaged a less attendance for a week than 15 per night.

It was decided to close one class in Elizabeth-street School and one in Bolton-avenue School, and that two classes in each of the following schools be amalgamated: Winchester, Parliament and Gladstone-avenue.

It was decided that a combined examination be held under the supervision of the prizes for the night school examinations be distributed on April 21 in Victoria Hall. It was recommended that \$100 be expended for prizes for the successful competitors in the examinations.




