

PRIZES.

A liberal number of Prizes are awarded at the Annual Examination before the Midsummer Vacation, in the disposal of which regard is had to the general deportment, as well as to the proficiency of, the various competitors during the whole Academic year.

MERIT ROLL.—That the pupil may be able to estimate her true position as a member of a class or department, the character of each recitation is noted in a book kept for that purpose.

CERTIFICATES.—Pupils who pursue only a partial course of study at the Institution, receive, if deserving, special certificates of qualifications and attainments.

DIPLOMAS.—At the close of the Academic year, the Commencement Exercises of the Senior Class take place; those who have passed through the requisite course of studies, and have made such attainments as to merit the distinction, receive Diplomas, which are the highest honors of the Institution.

BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, ETC.

The College is situated within a mile of the city limits, in the most prominent and healthy locality, on the banks of the River Thames.

The GROUNDS comprise ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY ACRES, part of which is laid out and planted with a view to ornament, with ample PLAY GROUNDS, &c., and the remainder is cultivated as a Farm and Garden for the use of the College.

The Main Building is 118 feet in length by 60 feet in depth, with spacious CORRIDORS on each floor to the full length of the building, and a VERANDAH in front of the building 10 feet in width.

The Building contains a Chapel Room, spacious Class Room, Dining Hall, Library, Drawing Rooms, Parlors and Bed Rooms, Sanatorium, Baths—hot and cold—and all other appurtenances belonging to a College.

The whole premises have been expressly planned and arranged so as to secure every possible facility for the Educational and Domestic requirements of the pupils. The Ventilation and Heating are on the most modern and approved plans, and are perfect.

REMARKS.

- 1st. It is especially desired that the *Dress* of Pupils shall be simple and inexpensive. Simplicity saves time and thought and money, which to a Scholar are precious for higher purposes.
- 2nd. NOVELS or WORKS OF FICTION are not permitted in the College. Apart from the evil effects upon the youthful mind, from the reading of such books, the invariable result is that SCHOOL LESSONS ARE NEGLECTED.
- 3rd. Pocket money furnished to the pupils to an extent beyond their actual wants, is much deprecated, as it is injurious alike to the Pupils and College.
- 4th. Every article of Clothing belonging to a pupil should be distinctly marked with her name in full.
- 5th. The Pupils enjoy unrestricted liberty in corresponding with their Parents or Guardians.
- 6th. VISITORS.—None but Parents or Guardians are permitted to visit Pupils; other visitors can only be permitted by letter of introduction to the Principal or the Lady Superintendent.
- 7th. No Pupil can be allowed to spend any portion of her time out of College during the Term, unless accompanied by her Parent or Guardian.
- 8th. All Pupils are required to attend the College Chapel Services.
- 9th. A report of the progress, conduct and general proficiency of each Pupil, will be sent to Parents or Guardians at the end of each Term.
- 10th. Confidential communications pertaining to the personal welfare of the Pupil, to be addressed to the Principal or Lady Superintendent.
