#### Religious Notes.

A very practical step in connection with city mission work has been taken by the Richmond (London) Christian Mission, in the establishment of a Holiday and Rest Home for Women. It is not to be exactly a charity, as the women will be expected to pay a small weekly sum. In commenting on this 'The Christian' says: The Home will be conducted as much as possible on the plan of a family, and all will be expected to attend prayers morning and evening, as well as the services at the mission hall or some other place of worship—so that all will be under Gospel influences. . . . . The land on which the Home and mission hall stand has been paid for, and less than £700 remains to be raised of the cost of building.

The 'Student Volunteer' movement is having practical results in England. A conversation with the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Manchester, reported in the London 'Christian Age,' deals with his open-air services. In these he has been greatly assisted by some dozen young students who are interested in the movement, indeed the children's morning services on the sands have been entirely run by them. The Bishop has written most entrusiastically about his summer open-air work. 'I regard this,' he said, 'as a precious and unique opportunity. You have people from all over the country, and have a chance of influencing them for good. There are great advantages about open-air work, advantages which you do not get in church or chapel. In the first place, people believe you are in earnest. You are not paid to do this, so why should you?' The 'Student Volunteer' movement is hav-

Surprised at the receipt of such a communication, he wrote to the dealer and asked him 'if he found it worth while to send such advertisements to ministers, and also enclosed a copy of a sermon on the evils of intemperance. The distiller's reply was: 'I wish to acknowledge your letter, and in direct reply to your inquiry beg to state that it was not with any consent of mine that my circular reached you. My experience would not at all justify me, I am pleased to say, in wasting any postage stamps on ministers of the gospel. The circulars are sent out by an addressing company, and possibly the person who addressed yours had an idea in common with many others that ministers were consumers of whiskey. For myself, I am glad to know to the contrary. I could certainly have no quarred with either your letter or your sermon, which I read with much interest. If I were the one to give the decision, and it rested entirely with me, I would wipe out the whole traffic in intoxicating liquors without a moment's hesitation.
