S., and bearing for the author's name the well-known signature of J. F. Herbin. The scope of the little volume is well indicated in the first dedicatory verse.

These are but sketches of the common way,

Almost every aspect of the beautiful country in and about the Gaspereau valley is caught and held in some marvellous line. Perhaps the gem of the collection is the sketch on "The Broken Dyke."

Those who enjoyed Dr. W. D. Eastlake's delightful account of Japanese Home Life in the *Popular Science Monthly* for May will welcome a sketch of the Moral Life of the Japanese from the same pen, to be published in the July number. The article sets forth the actual attitude of this people toward various matters of right and wrong, and is fully illustrated with pictures of temples, priests, and sacred places.

Worthington Co., Joseph J. Little, Receiver, 747 Broadway, New York, have issued at No. 7 in their Fair Library, "The Ironmaster." "The Ironmaster" is a story of admirably sustained interest, skillfully told in graceful yet forcible language.
