

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LECTURES AND CLASSES.



HE Montreal Association has issued a circular announcing its course of lectures and classes during the coming year. It is

very complete, and represents an amount of thought and labor little conceived of by those whose privilege it may be to enjoy the fruits of that labor. The plan is much the same as that under consideration by our own Board, with this exception: We propose including all our lectures and ! classes in the usual membership fee of \$2. whereas they have established a scale of charges varying from \$5 to \$2, exclusive of a membership. Our arrangements are not sufficiently advanced to allow of a positive announcement being made, but we call attention of young men to the fact that a membership in this association for the ensuing year (costing \$2) will doubtless entitle to at least fourteen lectures with classes in phonography, book-keeping, drawing and elocution, and the use of a gymnasium. At the same time we wish it to be distinctly understood that while we offer all these advantages, we are aiming st something above and beyond mere social or mental development. It is souls we seek-young men for Christ-and it will be our honest endeavor to make all these appliances point towards one common centre, "the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world."
