Parish Notes.

The Harvest Festival will be held on Sunday,
 8th of October: Professor Clark has kindly pro-
 mised to preach at the Evening Service, and the
 Rev. Edward Cayley in the morning.

Sunday, October 15th, will be observed
 throughout the Church as a Day of Intercession
 for Sunday Schools. The day will begin with
 a Celebration at 8 a.m., at which the Rector will
 give a short address to Church Workers.

During the absence of the parochial Clergy
 on their summer holiday, the Church was under
 the care in July of Rev. F. Davidson, and in
 August of Rev. E. C. Cayley. During August
 the Rector paid two short visits to Toronto,
 but spent most of the summer on his island
 in Muskoka. Mr. Rounthwaite was away all
 August taking summer duty at a parish near
 Boston.

With October the work of the various parochial
 organizations begin. The W. A. hold their first
 meeting on the 6th, and the Harvest Festival
 inaugurates the special work of the Chancel Guild.
 Most of the Sunday School teachers have now
 returned from their holidays, but more are still
 wanted to take the place of two who are leaving.

There is so much to be done and so few to do
 it. Can we not rouse ourselves? Can we not
 say: "Be no longer a chaos, but a world or even
 worldkin. Produce, Produce! were it but the
 pitifullest infinitesimal fraction of a Product, pro-
 duce it in God's Name. 'Tis the utmost thou

OUR DEBT.

The offertory at the Harvest Festival on Sun-
 day next, the 8th inst., will be used to diminish
 our debt by pulling down the overdraft at the
 bank. An overdraft at the bank "does not pay."

 while the bank interest runs on. The congrega-
 tion will confer on itself a solid benefit by lessen-
 ing the debt, as well as find a good object for
