3. As of October 19, 1945, the total commitments are \$1,174,630 out of a total estimate of \$1,180,500.

4. With the exception of the three hour weekly test transmission to the West Indies and Latin America all programmes are broadcast on the European beam with programmes specifically directed to the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Holland and Czechoslovakia. Approximately 70 per cent of the time is devoted to programmes for Canadian Armed Forces.

5. The European beam is programmed twelve hours a day from noon to midnight London time. Latin American test transmission is scheduled Sunday nights from 6.45 to 9.45 p.m. E.S.T.

6. English, French, German, Dutch, Czech and Slovak with Spanish and Portuguese to Latin America.

7. Forces programmes are designed to provide Canadian entertainment and news from home. Programmes to other countries contain news bulletins and short talks and descriptive reporting designed to describe the Canadian scene.

8. The Department of External Affairs, the Department of Trade and Commerce, the Department of National Defence and the Canadian Information Service are all represented on the Joint Government-CBC Committee responsible for the development of the service.
