4. Mr. Young was with the Saskatchewan provincial department of natural resources from 1950 until 1965. As a staff member from 1950 to 1954, he supervised anthropologic and geographic studies in northern Saskatchewan where most of the inhabitants are Indians and Métis. As the assistant deputy minister from 1957 to 1962, he was responsible for co-ordinating the implementation of programs for the management and utilization of fish, fur and timber resources in the forested area of Saskatchewan. Many of the people dependent on these resources are Indians and Métis, and programming for resource use gave primacy to the needs of these people. During the period from 1950 to 1962, it was necessary to visit many native communities throughout the forest and precambrian areas of Saskatchewan, and he therefore attended meetings with trappers and fishermen and discussed problems about resource utilization. Mr. Young was chairman, from 1953 to 1957, of the northern advisory committee, a provincial interdepartmental group, whose purpose was to effect co-ordination in planning and program development for the native residents of northern Saskatchewan.

5. His duties and responsibilities are: He is responsible for the planning and development of a variety of programs designed to improve the economic well being of the Indians of Canada; the examining of the budget for Indian economic development and assessing it in the light of objectives and goals; surveillance of the implementation of the economic development budget; liaison with federal and provincial agencies; supervision of a headquarters staff and functional and technical supervision to a field staff. Mr. Young reports to the director of development.
