Would he clarify the situation for the House now?

THREAT OF OIL SPILL FROM SUNKEN "IRVING WHALE"— MEETING WITH PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND PREMIER— GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBILITY

Hon. J. A. MacLean (Malpeque): Mr. Speaker, I should like to pose a question to the Minister of Transport. Has the minister agreed to meet with the government of Prince Edward Island, as I believe they requested, with regard to the suggestion that it would be feasible to leave the *Irving Whale* lying on the bottom of the Gulf of St. Lawrence? Also, regardless of the decision in that regard, does his department accept primary responsibility for any oil spill that might occur?

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): Yes, Mr. Speaker, I will meet with the Premier of Prince Edward Island next Monday, April 9. I have already written a letter to Mr. Campbell on this subject and we are going to discuss it on Monday. There is no doubt that we accept responsibility. If there is an oil spill we are going to

assume the financial responsibility for cleaning up the whole thing.

THREAT OF OIL SPILL FROM SUNKEN "IRVING WHALE"— UNDERWATER INSPECTION

Mr. David MacDonald (Egmont): I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Could the minister indicate to the House when the last underwater inspection of the *Irving Whale* took place and when the next underwater inspection may take place in order to determine the actual condition of this vessel and the likelihood of it causing a serious pollution problem on the shores of Prince Edward Island?

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, a few days ago I asked the Minister of National Defence if he could help in examining the *Irving Whale*. I did not get any answer yet.

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Hees: That is not surprising; that is routine.

Mr. Marchand (Langelier): I know they have special devices that we do not have. As for the last date it was examined, I will inquire about that because I do not know exactly.
