ROWELL SPEAKS ON TAX REFORM

Present Law Should Be Amended.

(Special to The Toronto World), WOODSTOCK, Dec. 7.—Speaking efore the North Oxford Liberal Association here, on Saturday afternoon, N. W. Rowell, K.C., leader of the On-tario opposition, referred to the assessment law, especially with reference to the tax on Sir Henry Pellatt's Toronto castle, which was reduced by Judge Winchester a few days ago.

Under the present system, said Mr. Rowell, the poor man had to pay his taxes, while the rich man escaped. He did not blame Sir Henry Pellatt for taking advantage of the law by get. taking advantage of the law by getting his assessment reduced.

About a year ago, he continued, Sir James Whitney and Hon. W. J. Hanna, speaking in the legislature, stated that the present assessment law was all right, and that all that was needed was to have the law enforced. Any worse instead of better.
