The Hydro-Electric Commission in-troduced some notable legislation, the chief of which clears the way for in-stallation of radials on the bond guar-antee of municipalities. The right was gained to begin work in a new district on the petition of a county council, in-stead of awaiting a permissive bylaw, and the administrative powers of the commission were increased. The forest preserves of the province were increased by the purchase of the Pembroke Lumber Company holdings at \$185,000, and an incentive given to radium-hunters by a reward of \$25,000 to the lucky prospector. The cause of education was noted in a bill settling the deficit of the pro-vincial university at Toronto, and in the same connection an investigation by commission was foreshadowed. Cities may provide special classes for defective youngsters who fail in the day school.

school. Statutes Brushed Up. In view of an election, the relevant statutes were brushed up a bit. The Election Act was made to subscribe more closely to the demands of the electorate today, and political contribu-tions were forbidden from public con-tractors, license holders and others whose business relations might leave them open to suspicion.

Among the bills of special interet to cities occurred that which provides for voting on purchase of public utilities only on the date of municipal elections. Provision is also made for cities to establish detention hospitals for in-sane suspects. The Motor Vehicles Act went thru with minor amendments to the present law.


