## TURKS DRIVEN OUT OF REGION OF VAN

Russians Redeem Vast Dis-  
trict in Armenia and Oc-  
cupy Sultan's Territory.

## DEBACLE FOR ENEMY

Offensive Undertaken in Azer-  
baijan Province Ends in  
Big Disaster.

PETROGRAD, June 10, via London.  
Complaining a long statement on the  
Russian operations in the Caucasus,  
the general staff says:  
"By June 6 we had captured the vast  
region of Van and part of the Sanjak  
of Mouss. We had annihilated Khalil  
Pasha's original corps and we had clear-  
ed of Turkish troops the whole region  
between Lake Van and Ouzna."  
"On the right wing we occupied  
Turkish territory between the old  
frontier and the line of the Rivers  
Chokuk and Tortun, and the mountain  
range of Tchakhr Baba. An offensive  
which the Turks undertook in the Pro-  
vince of Azerbaijan ended in a de-  
finitive debacle."

## GERMANY REFUSES TO EXCHANGE PRISONERS

Negotiations for Transfers of  
Crippled Men Definitely  
Broken Off.

ROME, June 10.—Germany has  
broken off negotiations for the ex-  
change of wounded soldiers who are  
unable to further military service with  
all the belligerent countries. The ex-  
change was first only applied in re-  
sponse to British proposals.  
Various pretexts for this action have  
been placed before the Vatican, such  
as possible use of semi-military pri-  
soners still having an arm.  
These have made the worst impression  
at the Vatican.

## FRANCE TO INCREASE OUTPUT OF MUNITIONS

Workmen Now at Front Will Be  
Recalled to Factories.

PARIS, June 10.—The French Gov-  
ernment took action today for the pur-  
pose of increasing the country's output  
of war munitions. The plan, which is  
upon is designed primarily to facili-  
tate production by the private manu-  
facturing concerns which are working  
for the national defence.  
Workmen who have been called to  
the front, but whose services are con-  
sidered indispensable in particular  
branches of the industries affected,  
will be brought back and sent to the  
factories, other men taking their  
places in the trenches. Everything  
possible will be done to obtain the  
maximum output of war materials.

## CALLING FOR TENDERS

The Ontario Department of Lands,  
Forests and Mines is calling for ten-  
ders on a 2500-acre tract of pulp wood  
land just north of the Transcanadian  
Railway. Tenders must agree to ex-  
pend within three years a million  
and a quarter on pulp mills and equip-  
ment and must produce a certain  
quantity of paper pulp annually.

# AGINCOURT FARMERS' EARLSCOURT B. I. A. HAD BUSY SESSION

Representative Gathering Under Auspices of Local Institute. Executive Members Chosen to Replace Men Who Have Enlisted.

## INTERESTING CONTEST MANY STREETS CLOSED

Young Men Compete in Cattle Judging—Awarded Cash Prizes. Works Department Urged to Push Forward Some Local Improvements.

The annual gathering of the Agincourt branches of the Farmers' and Women's Institutes, held in that village yesterday, has probably never been excelled in attendance and interest. Each of the sessions being remarkably representative of the best in agriculture and domestic science to be found in York County. A feature of the farmers' big meeting, held in Heather Hall and immediately adjoining, was the stock judging under the personal supervision of C. F. Bailey, assistant deputy minister of agriculture, and W. J. Bell, live stock specialist, together with J. C. Steekley, county representative.

Stock judging is a comparatively new feature of the farmers' institute meetings, and great interest centred in the awards subsequently to the young men entered in the competitive tests as to the outstanding features in dairy and beef cattle. The deputy minister, at the close, expressed surprise and gratification at the expert knowledge shown.

Stock Judging Awards. The awards were as follows: Dairy cattle—1. J. M. Weir, Malvern; 2. A. E. Kennedy, Agincourt; 3. H. B. Elliot, Agincourt. In the judging in the best points in beef cattle, A. E. Kennedy won the first award, J. M. Weir second and Fred C. Neomans third. Each of the young men was given a cash award, but Mr. Weir, scoring the highest number of points in all, was awarded the handsome cup donated by Mrs. Joseph Kilgour of Sunnybrook Farm. Mrs. Kilgour was present during the afternoon at the ladies' meeting and herself presented the coveted trophy to Mr. Weir. Subsequently, at the request of Mr. Prutch, the meeting considered a proposition to supplant the Farmers' and Women's Institute by a new society, to be known as the Board of Agriculture, with some alterations and additions in the general makeup. No conclusion was arrived at and a later date to take this matter into consideration.

Women's Meeting. At the women's gathering held at the home of Mrs. John Elliott during the afternoon Mrs. Brethour and Miss Collins were the principal speakers, dealing chiefly with the advantages to be derived from institute work and country life in general.

Mrs. Kilgour gave a graphic description of the excellent work being done by the Agincourt branch, stating that the sum of \$120, contributed by the ladies at last fall's East York plowing match, as a result of their work there, had been forwarded to Folkestone Hospital, England.

This money had been spent in giving a banquet to the wounded soldiers, and views were shown of the event in question. A letter of appreciation from Miss Grand, a sister of Mrs. Kilgour, in Folkestone Hospital, thanking the Scarborough ladies for their many gifts, was also read.

The general meeting was presided over by William Doherty, president of the Farmers' Institute. Luncheon was served at the close.

On Thursday next the East York and South Ontario Institute hold their annual outing to the O.A.C. at Guelph, via C.P.R., and one of the largest excursions in years is expected. It is expected that a big delegation from the Toronto horticultural societies will join the party in the city.

## CANNOT GET PATHWAY THRU CEMETERY NOW

Trust Refuses to Deal With the City and Says Offer of Free Road Has Expired.

The following members of the board of education, Chairman Hodgson, Superintendent Bishop and Dr. Hunter, together with Reeve Thomas Griffiths, Deputy Reeves Fred H. Miller, W. U. Graham and Councilor T. McKay of the York Township Council, visited the Earlscourt district yesterday morning for the purpose of inspecting the proposed pathway thru Prospect Cemetery at a point near Morrison avenue.

The members of the board of education and township council had an interview with Superintendent Clarke of Prospect Cemetery, who informed the party that the offer made by the cemetery board of a road thru the cemetery free of charge a few years ago had expired on May 31, and as the city had not taken advantage of the offer the cemetery board will now deal with the York Township Council only.

The superintendent of the cemetery was assured by the members of the board of education that the railway question would be taken up at once, and thought that a strip of land five or six feet in width from Harvie avenue to the cemetery property should be immediately secured.

The township representatives thought that a 66-foot roadway might be purchased from Harvie avenue to the cemetery road, in order to make a continuous road to McRoberts avenue if a mutual arrangement were made with the city and owners of property did not hold up the prices.
