## RURAL TELEPHONES PAY.

Annual Meeting of the Rural Telephone Company.  
BROCKVILLE, March 13.—(Special.)—The ferry service on the river between Brockville and Marlborough, N. Y., conducted for many years by the present company, has been sold to the Brockville-Marlborough company, which has purchased the steamer J. P. Bigelow. The Rural Telephone Co. of Kitley, at its first annual meeting just held, showed that enthusiastic support had been given the enterprise. The finances of the company are in excellent shape, there being a clear surplus on the year's business of nearly \$200 over all liabilities.

Starting with \$10, the number of phones has increased to fifty, with applications for extensions in many directions. The trustees and directors were instructed to take the necessary steps to have the company incorporated.

Minister Declines to Disclose Correspondence.  
OTTAWA, March 13.—(Special.)—In the house this afternoon R. L. Borden asked Mr. Oliver for a statement with regard to the dismissal of Dr. Dickey, immigration officer at Halifax.

Mr. Oliver said it was deemed inadvisable to make public confidential correspondence as to the dismissal of Dr. Dickey, who has been arbitrating the passage of immigrants. The government had no knowledge as to the identity of W. Dods, Dr. Dickey's friend, who had been dispensed with.

## LOOKS LIKE WINNIPEG PASTOR

Rev. Dr. DuVall Probable Choice of Presbyterian Assembly.  
Rev. Dr. Frederick B. DuVall, pastor of Knox Church, Winnipeg, will undoubtedly be the next moderator, or convener, of the Presbyterian general assembly.

One who is familiar with the higher workings of the Canadian Presbyterian Church gave this assurance yesterday. The assembly meets in Knox Church, Winnipeg, the second Tuesday in June, which makes Mr. DuVall's election all the more certain. Not only will he receive the backing of the entire west, but he is now being favored for the office by many of the eastern Presbyteries.

The official organ of the church, published by Rev. Dr. M. Macgregor, has also a special photo of Dr. DuVall in anticipation of his election.

Dr. DuVall is of Huguenot extraction, and has occupied his present pulpit since Dr. Chas. Gordon vacated it for the principality of Queen's University.

Rev. Dr. Campbell of Montreal is the present president of the assembly.

## LABOR DISPUTE ENDED.

OTTAWA, March 13.—(Special.)—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux received a despatch this afternoon from Prof. Shortt, who has been arbitrating the difficulty between the Dominion Coal Co. and its employees, that the dispute had reached a satisfactory conclusion.

## CALLS IT BRIBERY.

Fort William's Bonus of \$50,000 to a Car Company.  
"Legalized municipal bribery" was Hon. J. S. Hendrie's view of the Fort William bill in the private bills committee yesterday. A bonus of \$50,000 was provided for to benefit the Fort William Car Co., Ltd. Besides this a guarantee of \$35,000 bond issue, to be paid in the event of a default, was provided. The company guaranteed to employ 500 men at first and to increase to 1,000, F. J. Morris, city solicitor, said the business was wanted by the townspeople and there was no car company further west. The clause was carried by 5 to 5.

## JUSTICE AT LAST.

Privy Council Restores to Widow Verdict Against Street Railway.  
In December, 1904, David King, a driver for the Nassimith Company, was killed by a street car while driving across Yonge-street.

In January, 1906, the widow was awarded \$4500 damages against the Street Railway Company. On a technicality the company secured on appeal and the plaintiff offered to settle for \$1200, but was refused, the company going to the supreme court to ask that the case should be dismissed. Meanwhile the widow got the master-in-chambers to reduce the verdict to \$3299, and the supreme court is powerless to act in sums under \$4000. The court of appeal then gave the company leave to appeal to the privy council.

Yesterday A. J. Russell Snow, K.C., called here from London that the privy council has restored the trial judgment for \$3299 with costs, which may reach \$7000.

Mrs. King is at present in ill-health. Mr. Snow's services have been voluntary.

James Crowe, 30 years, rooming at 18 Grove-avenue, was discovered moaning in his bed early yesterday morning. Medical aid was called, but the man was dead before the doctor arrived.

pipes be provided in each school, and that a coil of hose, nozzle and ready at all times for instant use, be installed on each floor.

Mr. Bishop further adds: "Our reliance for safety from fire in the buildings under your control has been chiefly in having stairs, halls and exit doors of ample capacity with short training of pupils in fire drill. "While our schools are not what is known as modern fire-proof construction, much has been done from year to year to improve them in this respect and many of them approach closely to all that may be considered necessary. "A large amount of work has been done in the past few years to improve the protection from smoke pipes, gas lights or heaters and from handling ashes, etc. Within a day or two all repairs to plaster or sheet iron covering up of smoke pipes, gas pipes, etc., will be in good condition, in every case conforming with the work that we have so far been doing in this respect."

"Each building is supplied with at least one fire extinguisher and these are now being examined and drilled by an expert in the construction and handling of such apparatus to see that they are in proper condition. "The total number of exit doors is 282, of which more than one half have been supplied with checks and springs, and the doors are fastened during school hours with bolts, but not locked."

Principles of Drill.  
In a letter to The World Inspector Hughes says: "There are three fundamental principles in a well conducted drill. First, the doors should be opened and fastened back. The boys whose duty it is to do this sit next the door of their room on the ground floor, and they should run to perform their duty. All other pupils should walk. Second, the pupils in a fire drill should walk slowly. Haste may cause a panic, and the great purpose of a fire drill is not to get the children out quickly, but to make a panic impossible."

"The halls should be filled with smoke occasionally, at the drills so that the children may have no reason to become panic stricken in case of a real fire."

"We have had a fire drill in Toronto longer than in any other city, and during the last thirty-three years we have had several hundred fires in the city. There was a tendency to a panic, although in three cases the fire burst into a room where the children were seated, and in two cases within two feet of the children."

"It takes a fire a long while to burn through the doors, and from our largest schools the children can walk out in less than two minutes when all the exits are available for use."

"In a recent fire at the school, because the rear exit could not be used, the children, under the direction of the school, the pupils walked out at a very slow pace by one exit in two minutes and started in the basement of the school could possibly burn through the floor and reach the stairs in less than half an hour."

"Much has been said about the danger to the children on third storeys in schools. In the matter tested, and that in 18 seconds after a fire alarm is given the last child on the third storey has left the third storey on his way out, in a twelve-roomed school. In thirty seconds or less, the third storey of our largest schools is cleared in a fire drill."

"In order to calm the natural excitement in the minds of parents, I wish it could be arranged to have a meeting of the board of trustees, members of the board of trade and of the fire department or of other bodies visit as many of our schools as possible, to see our fire drill at unexpected times."
