WOODROW WILSON, HEAD OF PRINCETON, CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR OF STATE

Will Lead the Democrats in New Jersey—Spoken of as Probable Candidate for Presidency for 1912.

PRINCETON, N.J., Sept. 15.—Dr. Woodrow Wilson, who was yesterday nominated for governor of New Jersey by the Democratic state convention, said this afternoon that he would offer his resignation as president of Princeton University to the board of trustees at its next meeting on Oct. 20.

Wilson for governor of New Jersey in 1911 and for president of the United States in 1912. This is said to be the program of New Jersey Democrats and others.

Woodrow Wilson has never been known as a politician, although he has been an educator of prominence.

His Program. Outlining his views on political questions of the United States and of the world generally, which he hopes to preside after next election, he said today:

"What I wish most for the State of New Jersey is a system whereby the haphazard business of the state may be ended and a more thorough and conscientious system devised.

"Secondly, I would like to see the taxation of the state equalized. I do not believe that the taxes which are levied are equitably adjusted.

"If a law is violated, someone has violated it, and that individual should pay the penalty. I am not in favor of putting a rich man in jail in any case."

"I believe a state should take up the regulation of its corporations, but I do not believe that the state's activities should be so jealously guarded as to prevent federal regulation."

Canada and the National Policy.

Canada has prospered exceedingly under the National Policy, sanctioned by parliament in 1879. It did not embody high protection, but was and is properly a system of moderate and qualified protection.

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RAILWAY PROJECT STIRRING UP GUELPH

Whether or Not to Assist New Electric Radial Route is the Problem Which Has Earnest, Public-minded Citizens of Different Minds—A Review of the Facts.

GUELPH, Sept. 15.—(Staff Special.)—Two bylaws are to be submitted to the ratepayers on the 26th inst. in connection with the proposal to grant certain privileges to the People's Railway.

The railway is said to have had a romantic origin in the incident of a young man having visited a particular friend at Plattersville and having been snowed up, when the convenience of a trolley by the railway was commented upon.

It is believed that the municipality will do much to rebuild the rural traffic, of which the city was a centre.

Another point that appeals to the public ownership supporters is the fact that the new railway may be electric power, and the commission has promised, thru Hon. Adam Beck, to give the city credit for all the power used by the railway.

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TRIP THRU THE RAPIDS IS POSTPONED A DAY

Cleveland Navigator Will Make Venturesome Trip Sunday To Accommodate Excursion.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., Sept. 15.—(Special.)—After being offered substantial inducements by several railroads to postpone his trip thru the Whirlpool Rapids in a motor boat from to-morrow till Sunday, Capt. Larsen, Cleveland, to-night announced that the trip would be made Sunday afternoon.

The importations of men for the Cuyahoga Carpet Works, Montreal building trade, Fenner knitting mills, and the Copley, Noyes and Randall clothing firm of Hamilton were mentioned in the discussion.

Against Labor Exchanges. A resolution deprecating the establishing of imperial labor exchanges in Canada was passed. It was pointed out that after provincial and federal Canadian exchanges were adopted and proven satisfactory, it was time to have an imperial exchange.

DRAWING A FINE LINE Brotherhood Meeting in Theatre on Sunday Against Law.

MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—Rev. J. Edgar Hill wrote a letter to Bishop Partridge to-day, on behalf of the Lord's Day Alliance, telling his lordship that the proposed meeting of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew on Sunday at the Princess Theatre was in contravention of the city bylaw.

SAVED FROM TERRIBLE FATE Little Hamilton Girl Nearly Swept Over the Falls.

NIAGARA FALLS, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—Nelle Galt, aged 11, of Hamilton, was rescued from drowning in the whirlpool at the falls by Joe Mareau this afternoon.

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2 MORE PUBLIC BATHS AT COST OF \$9000 A YEAR

Will Serve East and West Ends of the City—Experiment Has Proven Successful.

Two more public shower baths, one for the east, and the other for the west end of the city, are to be recommended by Property Commissioner Harris, who is highly pleased with the results of the Harrison baths experiment.

Mr. Harris has not yet estimated the initial cost of installing the baths, but figures that the expenses of maintenance will be \$4500 each, or \$9000 a year.

The commissioner would like to have plunge baths in conjunction with the central Harrison baths, but the existing bath house cost \$45,000 to build and \$15,000 to run.

Larsen is the only one of twelve original entrants in the trip thru the rapids proposed by a Cleveland motor boat magazine, who did not get cold feet.

But two other men have negotiated the rapids in a boat, and neither of them had any motive power, but they both came thru successfully. The first of these was Charles A. Percy, a wagon maker of Suspension Bridge.
