Out at Dufferin Park

Never in the history of harness racing in Toronto have there been as many trotters and at the one spot as there are now in and at the one spot as there is now in active training at Dufferin Park in preparation for the opening of the Canadian circuit, which opens at the above-named track next Tuesday, June 4, and which will be a most interesting event. At the present writing quite 25 horses are quartered in the two rich stables of \$100 each—the one for the 2:24 trotters, given by the Maher Horse Exchange, and for the 2:30 pacers, by the Union Stock Yards of Toronto. Also the J. H. Smith C.P.R. land department, at Yonge-street, purse of \$500 for 2:30 pacers.

Yesterday was like an old-time matinee. The stand had its quota of sightseers, as well as the wise ones, with their watches in hand and getting a correct line on the chances of the different horses that were getting their preparation for race day. There were a number of very satisfactory workouts yesterday afternoon. Today will see a number of the speedy ones get almost their final workout before race day.

YACHT RACING
SEASON OPENS

R.C.Y.C. 14-Foot Dinghies,
Members of L.S.S.A., Con-
test on Saturday—
The Rules.

The Royal Canadian Yacht Club opens the season on Saturday with a 14-ft. dinghy race, open to all L.S.S.A. dinghies. The prizes are as follows:

First prize—Sterling silver cup and flag, to become the property of the winner, flags to second and third.

The race must be sailed under the rules of the L.S.S.A. and all dinghies must be under way before the firing of the preparatory gun.

Entries must be in the hands of the secretary of the R.C.Y.C. on or before Friday, May 31, 1912.

The official time must be taken from the clock placed at the end of the R.C.Y.C. wharf. 2:30 p.m.: preparatory gun, 2:35, starting gun, 4.

Course—Twice around the triangular course in the bay.

Buoys—The starting and finishing line to be between the buoy (white barrel with R.C.Y.C. burgee), bearing N.W., off the end of the R.C.Y.C. wharf and the starting buoy. The northern buoy (white barrel with red flag), of the triangle placed off the foot of Church street, and bearing N. by E. about one mile from the starting buoy. The eastern buoy (white barrel with red flag), of the triangle, is placed to the east of the line of the eastern pier of the eastern gap and bears N.E. by E. about 1 1/4 miles from the starting buoy, and S.W. by E. about one mile from the northern buoy.

Direction around course—Instructions as to which direction to sail around the course will be given from the starter's stand by the firing of the preparatory gun. If a red flag is hoisted all buoys are to be left to port. If a blue flag is hoisted the finish line is to be made across the line between the starter's boat and the starting buoy.

Time limit: Three (3) hours. If, in the judgment of the starter, none of the competing dinghies can finish the course in the prescribed time limit, he may call the race off on the completion of the first round, by firing two guns, or by two short blasts of the whistle, and the result will be decided on the position of the dinghies at the completion of the first round.

All dinghies must carry their L.S.S.A. numbers conspicuously displayed on both sides of the mainsail, as directed in the L.S.S.A. rules.
