

TRADE IN CANADA.

Advances in the Prices of Sugars and dis Wheat \ 1 . Increased Business. R. G. Dun & Co. say: The move-ment in Montreal wholesale circles does not show any material increase a week ago. City retail trade in dry goods and kindred lines is quiet. In the eastern townships and different tother sections of the province, as well de as in Eastern Ontario, the scarcity of co other sections of the province, as well das in Eastern Ontario, the scarcity of snow continues, and is the excuse generally advanced by country dealers for their inability to make better remittances. The banks are evidently conserving their resources, and money may be called tight. Some of the banks do not seem over anxious to make loans except on large margins on the approved stocks. This policy, no doubt, largely accounts for the decline noticeable in many leading stocks. Within the week advances have been established in sugars and turpentine, also a slight advance in green hides. There is a slight improvement in trade in dry goods at Toronto. The more seasonable weather and better roads have tended to create an increased demand, and the feeling is more hopeful. Travelers are sending in fair orders of spring goods, and prices rule steady. In groceries the demand is said to be good, and the movement in sugars is satisfactory. Prices of both granulated and yellows are an eighth better than last week. The hardware trade is quiet. There are a good many complaints of poor trade in boots and shoes of late, and the number of failures in this line appears to be increasing. The uncertainty existing is demeralizing and prices in many cases are below the cost of preduction, Payments are only fair, and the numerous failures throughout the province have an unfavorable influence on the community. There is another advance in prices of wheat owing to limited offerings. Supplies are said by some to be comparatively small, and holders in many instances look for much higher quotations. The money market is firm, with call loans quoted at 5 1-2 to 6 per cent. and prime commercial paper discounted at 6 to 6 1-2 per cent.
