The Pennsylvania to Erect Morgues for Remains of Killed Trespassers and Employes.

Within the last 30 days the New York Central has placed contracts for 5,000 new freight cars, adding 2,500 to the

The Pennsylvania will erect morgues for the reception of the remains of employes and trespassers killed on their lines. The first will be erected at Harrisburg, work having absolutely been commenced.

Atlantic seaboard lines, by a new freight classification agreement, effective Feb. 1, change the minimum carload weight from 24,000 to 30,000 pounds. The St. Paul Globe says that Freder-

ick B. Underwood, general manager of the Soo road, is to become general manager of the Baltimore and Ohio system, and that he would be succeeded on the Soo road by W. F. Fitch, general manager of the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic road.

Parker, city contracting agent here, succeeds Mr. Hunter as general traveling agent; Wm. Delaney succeeds Mr. Parker; Dan Fletcher succeeds Mr. Delaney, and Charles Sulkowski takes the place of Mr. Fletcher. A. R. McIntire, assistant superintendent at Battle Creek, has resigned. The Grand Trunk has also determined to abolish its freight office at Cincinnati.

The Railroad Gazette in its yearly statistics of the output of locomotives and cars, states that during the past year all the contracting locomotive shops in the United States, outside of the railroad shops, contracted 1,875 locomotives, as against 1.251 last year. This is an increase of 624. This increase comes within 71 of representing the total output of 1894, and is greater by 218 than the increase of 1895 over 1894, which increase was the largest since 1877. The total output of cars will aggregate 105,158, of which 99,804 are freight, 699 passenger and 4,650 street cars. Of these 1,663 were for export. The past year was the best for the carbuilding industry since 1890, the recordbreaking year, when the total number of freight and passenger cars built by contracting firms was 103,000.


