GRAIN CONTRACTS VALID

U. S. Court G'ves Important Decision as to Future Deliveries

St. Paul, Nov. 9 .- The United St. court of appeals handed down a decis upholding the validity of contracts the purchase and sale of grain for fute delivery, as it is practiced by the Chica b Board of Trade and the Merchants' Exchange, of St. Louis. The case is that of Thomas A. Cleage, jun., appellee, against W. H. Laidley and others.

Cleage, jun., dealt in about 14,000,000 bushels of grain, and less than 2 per cent was delivered. He testified that he did not intend to deliver or to receive any grain under his contracts, unless forced to do so in order to prevent his contracts being closed out under the rules of the board or the exchange. The brokers to whom he became indebted filed a creditor's petition in bankruptcy, upon which Cleage was adjudged to be a bankrupt.
