

The onion crop will be much below the average. In the Scotland district, Brant County, where onions are grown extensively, they have made rapid growth, but mildew has appeared, and will materially affect the yield.

Sweet corn will be fair. Melons will yield a good crop. The tomato crop will be very light. Growers probably will not grow as large an acreage of steeple of which I could see from my tomatoes next year.




