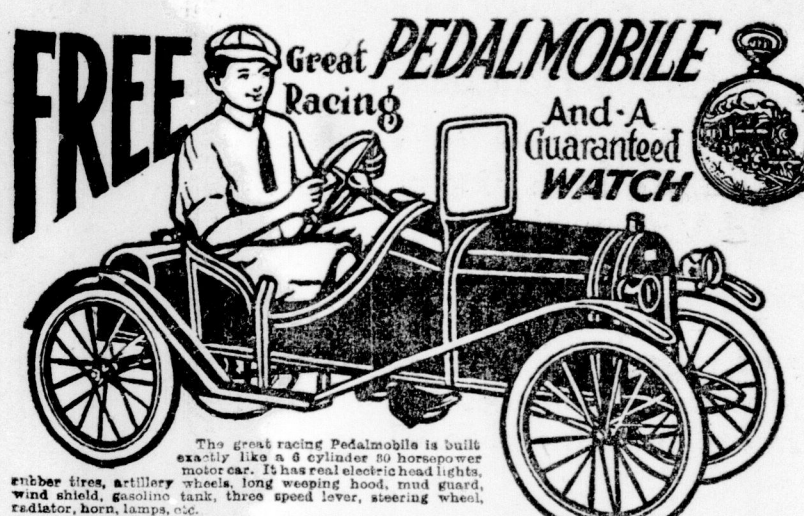

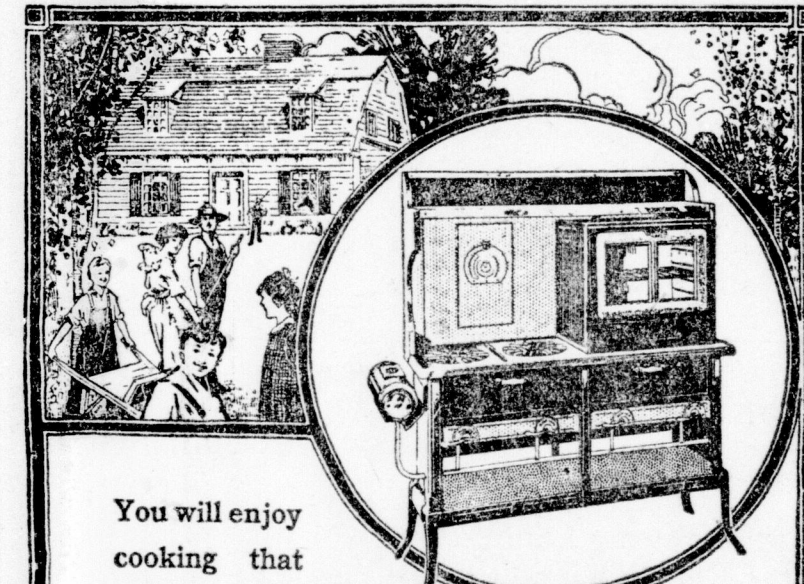

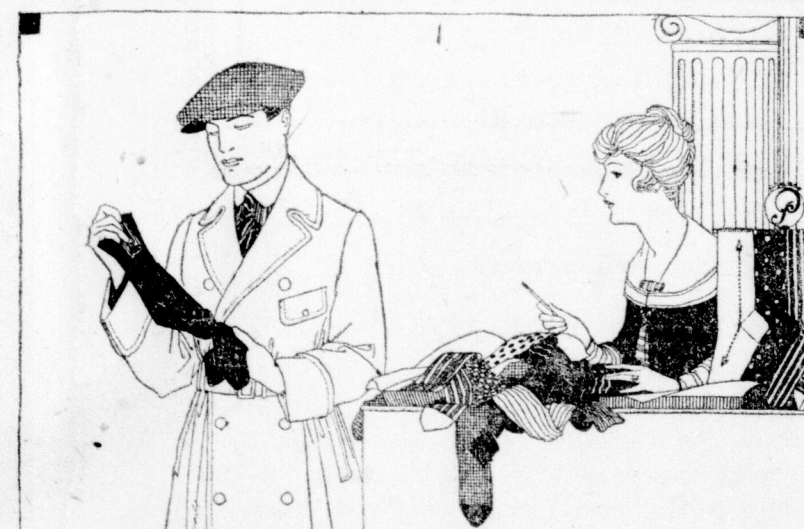

GOVT. AT STANDSTILL IN PROSECUTING WAR, SO CLUBS TAKE HAND

"Win the War" Organization Formed in London.

MAJOR CRONYN CHAIRMAN

Important Resolutions Passed Urging Concentration of All National Resources.

A "Win the War" organization was formed last evening at the Tecumseh House, representatives from the Canadian Club, board of trade, Rotary Club, Ad. Club and other societies being present.

The movement, which will reach a climax in a monster convention in Montreal on May 25, 26 and 27, was unanimously indorsed, and delegates will be asked from the various organizations to attend.

The officers elected were as follows: Chairman—Major Hume Cronyn. Vice-Chairman—J. H. Pope. Treasurer—C. E. Bowker. Secretary—H. C. Cameron. Chairman of the Delegates' Committee—A. W. White. Chairman of the Finance Committee—Philip Pocock.

Representatives on the Ontario Executive: Major H. Cronyn and Dr. Waller.

Major Cronyn presented a report of the meeting of the organization in Toronto, when the plans were discussed. It was decided to organize the resources of Canada, in men, money and products, in order to more strenuously prosecute the war. The province of Quebec was thoroughly aroused, and strong resolutions of sympathy with the movement had been passed. It was thought that by having a monster meeting in Montreal, a greater spirit of unity in Canada might prevail.

At a Standstill.

"We felt that the Government had outlived its term, and that in most departments it was at a standstill," said Principal Waller. "We desire to urge a more vigorous prosecution of the war, and to organize a force of commercial, industrial, agricultural and military, so that this country may do its full share. The convention, it was thought, would be a great unifying force in bringing together the various elements, making a united Canada, indeed."

Major Cronyn then presented the following resolutions, which will be forwarded to the executive, with a request that it be taken into consideration:

Enforce Service.

1. Under the Canadian militia act, war measures act, compel every British subject, by birth or naturalization, between the ages of 18 and 45, to do his full share in the prosecution of the war. This measure to be enforced, and the military authorities, and the department of justice, defaulters to incur severe penalties.

2. After mobilization, draft by ballot from 50,000 to 75,000 of those enrolled between the ages of 18 and 30, unmarried or widowers without children (class 1, under the militia act). The country to be divided into areas, and the number drafted from each area to be defined.

3. Each man thus selected to be medically examined, and if medically fit, to appear before a tribunal, who shall decide whether he be fit for military duty, or whether his services are more urgently required for the commercial or agricultural interests of Canada.

4. Those chosen for military duty to be attached to the military units in the district wherein they reside. These units to be put on an active service basis for some definite period, and to go into camps of instruction.

5. Each unit so mobilized to organize a company for overseas service, composed of those men who volunteer for that service.

6. An efficient passport law to be enforced to prevent slackers from leaving Canada. Those boys are earning their money and are returning to Canada who, since the war, have left Canada to escape military duty.

Objection Sustained.

In discussing the motion, J. M. McEvoy protested against a military medical board having the final disposition of the men, and the clause was amended to the effect that a civil tribunal shall say where the men are most needed, and where they can do the most good, and a civil medical board shall examine the men.

Principal Waller thought that some recognition should be made of the men who are actually needed in agriculture, munitions-making, in brief, all commercial, industrial and agricultural pursuits. There should be a minimum wage for those who are actually needed in agriculture, and the men should be properly organized to obtain the maximum of efficiency.

J. A. Buchner thought that the recruiting officers were too busy in the farming districts at the present time, and were seriously interfering with production. He suggested that this be stopped in some way or other, at least until the harvest is safely gathered.

"The farming communities have not done their share," declared Mr. McEvoy. "There are plenty of men and women who cannot go to the front who can do this work."

"Mr. Buchner has not told the whole story," said A. W. White. "Conditions are worse than some folks imagine. At the same time, we should not interfere so long as the voluntary system of recruiting is in force."

Principal Waller introduced his suggestion in the form of a motion, and it was unanimously adopted. Mr. Buchner withdrew his suggestion.

Mr. McEvoy thought that men who offered their services to their country, and who were found unfit for military work, should be kept in service, either in manufacturing plants or on the farm, resolution covering his ideas was presented to the executive at Toronto.

UNANIMOUS CALL FOR REV. PETER JAMIESON

At a meeting of the congregation of the Knoxwood Park Church last evening presided over by Rev. Mr. McKay, a unanimous call was extended to Rev. Peter Jamieson to become pastor. Mr. Jamieson has been in charge of the church for some time, and under him the work has progressed so satisfactorily that the congregation wants him to remain. The call will be considered at a meeting of the London Presbytery to be held on Tuesday in St. Thomas.

TURNED DOWN REWARD

Flora McDonald's Character Praised by St. Andrew's Society Speaker.

The members of St. Andrew's Society listened to an interesting address on "Flora McDonald" at their monthly meeting last evening. The speaker, being Alexander Fraser, the part which the Scottish heroine played in rescuing followers at Culloden and when the reward of £200,000 was offered for his head, was told in considerable detail, and with sympathetic appreciation, her act as illustrating the highest type of Scottish character. A vast amount of money in those days, equal to more than a million dollars today, and would have proven a great temptation to any people less loyal. Mr. Fraser was able to give an intimate touch to his descriptive story because of his familiarity with the points in Scotland of which he spoke. A vote of thanks was tendered him upon motion of Malcolm McCormick, seconded by J. C. Anderson.

The question of discontinuing the meetings during the summer months was considered, and it was decided that this was not desirable.

I. O. O. F. INITIATION LAST EVENING WAS GREATEST IN YEARS

Over 800 Brethren Here From All Over District.

HAMILTON DEGREE TEAM

Finest Exemplification of the Work Ever Seen in City.

Eight hundred Oddfellows gathered at the old I. O. O. F. Hall on Dundas street last evening, and witnessed the exemplification of the Degree of Friendship as conferred by Unity Lodge, No. 4, of Hamilton.

Fifteen candidates were initiated into the secrets of the first degree. They were from the city, St. Thomas, Clinton and other places. The event was the biggest affair in local Oddfellows history in years, and the interest manifested at last evening's gathering will have a tendency to stimulate local interest and add to the membership of the local I. O. O. F. lodges.

The work of the degree team of Unity Lodge was admirably the best ever seen in the city. The consensus of opinion was that nothing approaching it had been seen by those present, outside of Sovereign Grand Lodge conventions. WANT LEGAL CODE TO CONFORM TO MORAL LAW

At a meeting of the advisory council of the Men's Federation of London, held in their rooms last evening, the following resolution was referred to the executive committee for discussion at its next meeting:

Moved by Ald. Henry B. Ashplant, seconded by Dr. Ross: Whereas, the pursuit of righteousness is a first charge on the activities of Christian churches in industrial practice, and whereas, the legal code in Canada, in the matter of industrial exactions and working class wage relationships to the products of social industry, is grossly at variance with the moral law, as it is in other countries.

Therefore, this council of the Men's Federation of London recommends to the committee on industrial conditions that special effort be exerted to develop a campaign of educational propaganda, aiming at greater publicity of all available data on the moral and religious aspects of industrial exactions and the methods of distributing the wealth produced by social industry, to the end that righteousness shall take the place now usurped by unrighteousness, and the legal code shall conform to the requirements of the moral law in the commercial practice of Christian churches.
