ASK 1919 COUNCIL
TO TAKE CONTROL
OF PARKS OF CITY
Present Department Disgrace to City, Says Ald. Drake.

"Our parks department is a disgrace to the city and the sooner we take the public parks and boulevards out of its control and place them under the direction of the city engineer the better it will be for the city," said Alderman G. B. Drake last night at the meeting of No. 2 committee when the question of park management came up. The question was raised primarily in connection with Queen's Park and the Western Fair Board.

By the City of London bill of 1912 the management of all the parks and boulevards in the city was placed in the hands of the water commissioners, and an amendment to this in 1918 gave an interpretation of the act to mean that the parks and boulevards should be managed by the city engineer. The committee thought that the management of the parks could be greatly improved.

"Look at the newly constructed boulevard on Wellington street north," said Ald. Drake. "It has grown a lovely crop of weeds this year, but the only trouble is that no person has taken the trouble to cut them."

It was pointed out that while practically \$20,000 per year was granted to the parks committee for the upkeep of the parks and boulevards it was nearly all spent on Springbank Park and the rest were neglected.

On the motion of Ald. Drake the council of 1919 will be advised to take such steps as may be necessary to reveal the sections of the City of London bill which place the care of the parks and boulevards under this committee.

It was decided to authorize the expenditure of \$500 on the opening up of Paul street in West London. This will include the building of a bridge to the hill to connect the upper and lower portions of the street.

The street has been opened for some years, with the exception of this part which it was decided should now be opened.

Will Visit Jail.
Controllers J. M. Moore and J. H. Saunders and Ald. R. Winnett, in company with Building Inspector H. A. Piper and County Engineer C. Talbot, will visit the county building this morning to inspect the heating arrangement. It has been proposed to install radiators in the jail and heat it from the county building boiler, which will burn soft coal. This committee was appointed some time ago to confer with the county engineer as to the advisability of the work. It is expected that the city would be able to save nearly 100 tons of anthracite coal for the use of the citizens if the work were done this fall.

The petition from residents of South London for the purchase of the Fraction bridge or the building of a new bridge as a substitute, was laid over until the report of Engineer H. A. Brazier is received. A letter was read from Manager W. M. Warburton of the Fraction Company, stating that with the right of way from Grey street to Grand avenue for \$15,000.

The plans of Engineer Brazier for the improvement to King street bridge to facilitate traffic on Thames street, were not adopted in full. It was decided to authorize the filling in required, and to construct the bridge on the east side of cementing the sewer which runs under the bridge. According to the figures of the engineer it would cost \$10,000 before the improvements would be finally completed. The general opinion of the meeting was that only such work should be done as would be necessary in order that the new factory building of Penman's, Limited, could be erected with a view to completing the work later.

A bill from the G. T. R. for \$70 rent of day stand, which the company claims is still owing, was referred to City Solicitor T. G. Meredith.

Several garbage department and works reports were read and adopted, and accounts were passed.

MEN IN KHAKI LEAD
WAY IN TUESDAY'S
WAR LOAN CANVASS

LONDONER SERVING WITH
U. S. MARINE TRANSPORT
IS VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA
Soldiers Excel in Buying Bonds as Well as Fighting—Have Already Raised \$200 Per Capita—Western Ontario Going Strong.

One hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars was London's contribution Tuesday to the Victory Loan, making the total for the city, \$2,859,550 in two days. The canvassers are beginning to find themselves and are getting familiar with their "bats," to use newspaper expression.

The fans of the day's work was undoubtedly the showing made by the military organization. Four hundred and thirty-seven applications for a total of \$34,450 have been turned in by the men in khaki, with a whole lot more to hear from.

"It is as yet too early to predict with any accuracy what may be expected from the campaign," said one member of the organization last night. "The canvassers are just rounding in to shape and will eventually produce results that is only natural that the first few days' large applications will not come in, as the investors will want a little time to talk matters over with the family before deciding."

Others Pay Better?
"While it does not seem credible, yet there are persons who seem to think that they can find investments that pay better. This may no doubt be true from one standpoint, but then these securities are just roundings in. The Victory Loan bonds, persons who speak of higher interest rates should remember that should this loan not be a success certainly no other investments would be of any great value."

"When we invest the money that the men at the front have made, these soldiers whose primary duty it is to fight and not to buy bonds, we are in a position to secure a higher rate of interest."

Big Result Expected.

About \$41,758 has been expended by the city engineer's department this year up to the 22nd of October. The work on the streets called for an expenditure of \$18,098.24. Pavement sweeping was the largest item, amounting to \$11,849.93 was spent on this work during the year. Street cleaning comes next on the list, and calls for an outlay of \$4,953.30. There was spent on sewers and culverts \$3,183.81. Street oiling cost \$2,358.

During the week ending October 22 pavement sweeping cost \$568.30. The sum of \$178.71 was spent on street work on the streets; street cleaning cost \$103.21, and \$96.15 was spent on sewers and culverts.

Faithful To Death,
Employee of Civic
Department Passes
Committee Pays Tribute To One Who Never Complained.

After twenty-one years of life, filled with useful labor for his fellow-creatures, the last few years of which were spent in the garbage department, one of the city recently succumbed to an attack of the flu. He had not been ill long, but it is thought on account of his age his system was not strong enough to ward off the attack. A faithful employee, he was never known to cause any trouble. His work was always done to the best of his ability.

While he was not a member of the federal laborers' union, he was with the men during the strike in the department this summer. He was quiet about the matter, and he would work in any department of the city, but not a pound of garbage did he handle.

A Proud Reputation.
His employers did not hold this against him, and after the strike was settled he fell into his regular niche in the department and performed his work carefully right up to the day before his demise.

In his work he came in contact with all classes of people, and to his credit he it said that never has any complaint been registered against him by a public which is generally prone to kick, whether there is a sufficient reason or not. His fellow-workers speak highly of him.

So well did he do his work that as yet no one has been taken on to fill his place. The matter was discussed at the meeting of No. 2 committee last night. A communication from Engineer H. A. Brazier, expressing his regrets at the loss of such a faithful employee was received. The fact that none of the relatives of the deceased are known is perhaps the reason for the committee failing to pass a resolution of condolence.

A Silent Tribute.
Business was suspended for a moment in silent tribute, however. Dismissing the problem of securing someone to take his place in the garbage department, the suggestion was made that one from No. 6 street should be too old to be of much more use on the fire department could be persuaded to take the vacancy on the garbage department. This one has been a good one in his day, but he is getting rather old and cannot stand the long runs.

A younger employee will be secured to take his place on the fire department. While in his younger days he may have sown his wild oats, if a horse may be said to sow this particular brand of oats. Ted, who was 24 years old, is sadly mourned by all the men in the department. He has gone the way of all horseflesh, in this vicinity at least, and his body has been sent to the horse haven on the Hamilton road.

is not authorized you will be ordered to "carry on" with your present home service until you are discharged from the service, or until your category becomes such that you are eligible for overseas service. When you will likely have an opportunity to perform the duty that you enlisted to do. Men are needed to perform military duties in Canada, and in serving here you have the satisfaction of knowing that it is through no fault of your own that you are not at the front.

REJECTED. Q.—Is there a war service badge issued to those who volunteered for the army, and were turned down as medically unfit for military service?
A.—There is a class D war service badge for such cases, but the issue of same was discontinued some time ago. Through an error it was recently announced that this badge was being issued at present. The error is regretted.

MOTHER. Q.—My son was called to report for military service on June 1. He was the only son at home, and was working 100 acres, and was granted "provisional leave" of absence in July. He received a discharge from his military service on October 31. 1. Would there be any chance of him obtaining an extension of leave?
2. If so, how would he proceed to obtain same?
3. What is the difference between "provisional leave" and "indefinite leave"?
A.—1. Yes, it is possible for him to obtain further leave expiring November 15.
2. If he has not already received an extension to November 15, he should telegraph to his commanding officer asking for an extension. If he reports for service October 31 he should apply to his commanding officer for an extension until November 15.
3. "Provisional leave" may be leave granted under certain conditions or pending investigation of a soldier's military record. It is also cancelled in other words it is temporary leave. "Indefinite leave" has no time limit attached to it, and may extend for months or an indefinite period. The military authorities reserve the right to cancel leave of absence if circumstances warrant them in doing so. Indefinite leave is granted by the authorities at their discretion, and is cancelled by military headquarters at Ottawa. Provisional leave is granted locally by district headquarters.

ANXIOUS. HARROW. Your case here, and you will be advised as to procedure, etc., in the near future. You have not yet received an extension of leave until November 15, telegraph your commanding officer immediately, requesting same. Failing this, parade before your commanding officer on reporting back to your unit and apply for harvest leave until November 15.

SUBSCRIBER. Q.—I am an electrician with a power company in Northern Ontario. I have been expected about the middle of July. My company has appealed my case to the board of appeals. I still have my old papers, but I have not been notified as yet to report for service.
1. Are these papers of any value to me or must I join the army immediately?
2. In what branch of the service is an electrician most valuable?
3. To whom should I apply for such enlistment and where?
A.—1. The papers you have expired are of no further use to you, but according to information received from the board of appeals, you have not yet been required to enlist until ordered to report for service under the military service act. If you have not yet been registered in accordance with the act, however, according to this information in order to provide yourself with papers to protect you from the police you should write to the deputy registrar whom you applied for and received exemption, asking for further exemption. If you have not yet been registered, you should write to the deputy registrar, asking for papers to prove your military status to the police. Then you will either receive further exemption or be ordered to report for service.
2. Canadian Engineers. If you wait until ordered to report for service you will have to serve in the infantry, with possibility of transferring to the Canadian Engineers later. If you enlisted now you could go directly to the Engineers, and a good electrician may be retained in this branch of the service in Canada for the war in connection with army construction work.
3. To any recruiting office in Ontario, or to the Mobilization Centre, Carleton Place, Ontario, or to the Canadian Engineers, London, Ontario. When enlisting state that you wish to join the Canadian Engineers, and if in the proper category you will be allowed to do so.

PATRIOTIC. Q.—Are there any war savings stamps issued for purchase in Canada by patriotic Canadians similar to the United States Government stamps?
