AS WORLD HAS CHANGED, SO MUST Keep Baby's Woollens CHURCH'S CUSTOMS

Rev. Dr. Dickie Tells Audience Church Must Be Readjusted.

We have come through the war to "We have come through the war to a new day and the church must be readjusted," declared Rev. Dr. H. Dickie, D.D., of Chatham, in the First Presbyterian Church last evening in the course of an address, upon the Forward Movement. "Ancient history, as it may be called, ended on August 4, 1914, and as the world has changed in the past few years, so must the church change its customs to be abreast of the times. While it is true that the old church accomplished a great amount of good in the past, it cannot live on that record, no matter how splendid it may be."

Dr. Dickie explained his belief that there is an absence of Christian funda-mentals in the world at the present time, and he defined them under three main subjects. The first was the abmain subjects. The first was the absence of prayer, especially in the homes. The heads of many households, after professing Christianity, live and conduct their homes as if there is no God, he said, and it is a mere camouflage. The second point was the absence of Christian fellowship; the close social and spiritual fellowship which was embraced by the old church is an unknown factor now. Then the speaker outlined the third point as the absence of Christian efficiency. Although the world contains many skilled artisans and professional men, there is an exceedingly small number of efficient church workers, and during the present unsettled condition of the world, the church workers, and during the present unsettled condition of the world, the problem of christianizing the people is the largest and most difficult task. The speaker did not suggest the reestablishment of the old church forms, but stated that they should be replaced by new, adequate forms. "This must be a time of reconstruction," he said, "and there is an uvgent need for the Forward Movement."

This deputation is by no means authorized to shout itself hoarse in de-manding that Sir Adam Beck remain chairman of the Hydro-Electric Com-mission. The members are merely to represent the city and see what action is proposed. The meeting is called by Mayor T. L. Church and T. J. Hannigan and the notice makes no reference to the chairmanship of the Hydro-Electric Commission. The needs of hydrometic hand the chairmanship of the Hydro-Electric Commission. Electric Commission. The needs of hydro must be clearly stated for pre-sentation to whatever administration is formed, say those who are calling the meeting.

"If the only business of the meeting is to support the present chairman I see no reason why anyone should go," said Ald. S. R. Manness. Other members of the committee said there was no official indication that this matter

would be discussed.
Ald. Keene pointed out that immediately after Sir Adam Beck's defeat
Mayor Church had declared he would call a meeting at once to have the hydro municipalities support Sir Adam as chairman of the hydro commission. This meeting, although the aim was not stated, looked very much like the one Mr. Church proposed, he thought "We should have a representative there no matter what they do," said Ald. Moorhead.

Authority to build a municipal depot for the city's street equipment may be asked of the people in January. It would comprise stables, garages, buildings for city wagons and trucks, blacksmith shops, repair shops and similar buildings. A special committee will go into the matter. sidered in detail.
