

ELORA, Feb. 20.—Hon W. E. Raney, attorney-general, who was supported on the platform at his meeting here tonight by Hon. JUMPING AT OTTAWA

ASKS HIGHER PAY

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—The total revenue derived from the police department of the city shows a most astonishing increase in comparison with previous years.

For the year 1918 the total revenue from all branches of the department only amounted to \$36,000, whereas last year, 1919, it was \$108,560, an increase of over \$70,000.

TEACHERS' FEDERATION

TRAFFIC SURPASSED THAT ON SUEZ CANAL Sugar Refiners Claim To

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 20 .- During the 262 days of the 1919 navigation season on the Great Lakes, an average of one vessel passed Detroit ever 20 3-10 minutes. The season closed December 18, and opened March 27. There were 6,938 vessels passed Detroit upbound and 9,487 downboand. Over 68,285,542 short tons of freight were carried through Sault Ste. Marie Canal, eclipsing the tonnage that went through the Suez Canal.


