

OTTAWA, May 19.—"I say that the Government's luxury tax s but a pseudo-luxury tax. It is in reality a tax upon necessaries." This was the opinion expressed by A. R. McMaster, M. P. for Brome, in the course of a vigorous and telling expose of the Borden Government fiscal methods and new budget proposals.

Does he think that a suit at \$45 is a luxury. Why, he should know that no man can buy a suit that will wear at anything like that price. If there is any class which deserve consideration by the Government, it is the proletariat, the man with small and fixed income, the salaried man who must dress on an equity with his employer, the man! with a big family, and that is the class which is to be hit by this so-called luxury tax."


