ITALIANS ARE STILL EATING WAR BREAD; NO BRIGHT PROSPECTS

Rev. Joseph Schweitzer Tells of Serious Conditions in Sunny Italy.

KITCHENER, Sept. 16.—Rev. Joseph Schweitzer, C. R., for the past nine years active representative of the local Resurrectionist Fathers on the advisory council of the congregation at Rome, returned here today. Father Schweitzer declared industrial conditions in Italy are in a most precarious state, and that he could not see any bright prospects ahead for Italy. The distinguished priest stated that Italians are still eating war bread, made of wheat substitute.

Rev. A. D. Diphuis of Cambridge, Mass., arrived here today to take charge of the New Jerusalem Church, since the death of the former pastor. The new pastor is from Holland.

Manager A. Rohan of the Dominion Sugar Refinery announced today that the company had 9,000 acres under cultivation, and will start its regular fall campaign on October 1 with a force of 500 hands. It is expected the campaign will last until after January. A record-breaking sugar production is expected.

TWO PEOPLE HURT WHEN AUTO UPSETS

Mrs. Wilson of London Has Her Arm Badly Broken.

CAMBRIDGE, Sept. 16.—An auto driven by Mr. Wilson of London road turned over near Uttoxeter, on the Erewmoot road on Wednesday evening. The car was full of passengers, and through a wrong turn made by the driver the car swerved and upset. Mrs. Wilson's arm was badly broken at the elbow and her father, Mr. Elliott, had his wrist broken. The car was not damaged. The accident occurred at about 10 p.m. and the car was overturned on its side. The passengers were not injured.

TILLSONBURG MILK TO REDUCE PRODUCTION

Reports of Closing Down Are Denied—Milk Producers Are Worried.

TILLSONBURG, Sept. 16.—The reports sent out from Toronto in regard to the closing of the powdered milk and condensing factories is causing a great flurry among Oxford farmers, but this afternoon the patrons of the local Borden Milk Company's factory were assured that the plant will not close on October 1, as stated in Toronto dispatches, but may curtail its production to a certain extent. It is expected that milk shut out from the surrounding factories will find its way to the local plant.

The funeral on Wednesday was conducted by Rev. Mr. Bucknrough of the Baptist Church. Interment was made in Port Elgin Cemetery.

FOUR PEOPLE HURT WHEN AUTO AXLE BROKE

WARDSVILLE, Sept. 16.—A serious accident occurred here yesterday morning when an auto in which Mr. and Mrs. John Readman and son and Mrs. Bondy were riding turned turtle on the hill near the farm of Simon Winger and the whole party were more or less badly bruised. That they escaped without fatal injuries is considered remarkable.

That the party was travelling this road was due to having been misdirected to Wardsville, where they purpose to spend the night and proceed to London in the morning. Just as the car, which was being driven by Mr. Readman, had crossed the crest of the hill and was descending, the rear axle broke on the left side and caused the breaking of the brake bands so that the driver had not control of the speed of the car.

To allow the car to continue its wild career down the hill looked like inviting total destruction, so Mr. Readman turned it into the bank, the crash which followed causing the car to turn turtle and smashing the top and windshield. Mr. Readman's foot was badly cut with glass from the windshield. Mrs. Readman was thrown clear of the car and received severe bruises on her left arm and shoulder. Their son had his head badly bruised, while Mrs. Bondy escaped with some rather painful minor bruises. The injured party was taken into Wardsville to the home of Rev. James Huser, where they were given medical attention. They will be able to return to their home in a few days.

UP THE AMAZON.

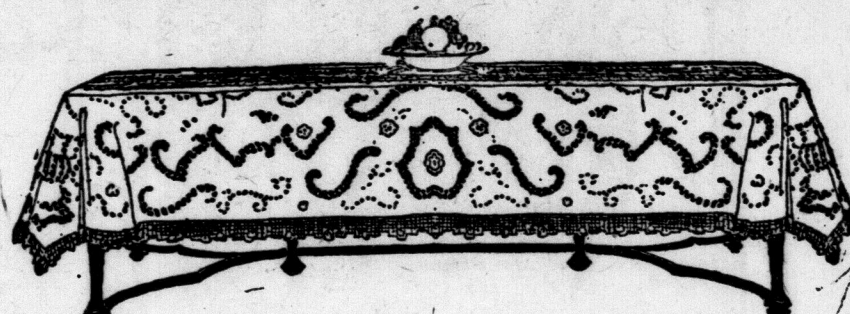
