Batting Averages of Firefighters' League

ARMOUR, MURRAY AND EDGAR TIE

Will Play Off Today in Three-Ball Match for Golf Championship.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—T. D. Armour, of Edinburgh, Scotland, Charles R. Murray, of Montreal, and Douglas Edgar, of Atlanta, present holder of the title, will fight it out in a three-ball match at the Rivermeadow Golf Club course tomorrow.

for the Canadian national open golf championship. In the annual tournament of the Royal Golf Association, which was to have been concluded tonight, Armour and Murray finished in a triple tie, each having a score of 99 for the four rounds of eighteen holes. They will drive off the first tee tomorrow afternoon at 12.30 in a match that will decide the championship. Dave Black, of the Shaughnessy Heights club, Vancouver, finished fourth with a card of 91, three strokes behind Armour, Murray and Edgar, while George Ayles, the Regina professional, who led the field on the first day's play, wound up fifth with a grand total of 92. Earl Keffer, of the Royal Ottawa, ranked next with 93, and there were four ties right after Keffer, as Louis Teller, of Boston, Nichol Thompson, of Hamilton, George Shaw, of Brockton, and Frank Adams, of Winnipeg, each turned in cards of 95. W. J.

Thompson, of the Missisquoi Club, Toronto, was next on the honor list with 96. Mr. Armour has the best score among the amateurs and will carry off accordingly, the gold medal, offered by the Royal Canadian Golf Association, and the cup donated by Sir Arthur Currie.

CARL ESLINGER CHALLENGES ANY C. W. A. RIDER.

The Canadian Wheelmen's Association received a letter from Carl Eslinger of the Niagara Athletic Club of Rochester, who is the western New York champion, in which he issues a challenge to any cyclist in the United States or Canada to a race for any distance from one to ten miles. The C.W.A. officials interviewed the Exhibition people and arrangements have been completed whereby Eslinger will be given a chance to show his ability on Athletic Day, Saturday, Sept. 11, in the open bicycle events. The Canadian cyclist who made the trip to the Olympic games at Antwerp will be home in time to meet Eslinger on this date, and as two of our boys have already beaten him in one race there sure will be some excitement when they meet at the shorter distance, and along the interest.
