COL. BRUCE'S REPORT CRITICIZES SOME OFFICERS OF MEDICAL SERVICE

While we do not propose to enter into the merits of the controversy which has arisen over the administration of Canada's Medical Service, there are one or two points in the remarkable report of Colonel Herbert A. Bruce of Toronto, recently made public, in which the public are entitled to take an interest, apart altogether from the professional matters involved. They have regard to conditions in Canada and not the conditions overseas. They are conditions for which the government is directly, primarily and wholly responsible.
