Successful Naval Engagement  
Armstrong Clifford, of the court staff, is now wearing the laurels won in a successful naval engagement. Single-handed, in command of an unarmed motor boat he held up a big merchant steamer and captured nearly the entire crew. The incident occurred yesterday and had its origin in a case before the circuit court. A prisoner, charged with stealing a gramophone from the steamer, was brought before the court and it was then discovered that the witnesses, consisting of members of the crew, were not present. Clifford was delegated to bring them to court and left for the wharf front on that mission, only to find that the steamer had left the wharf and was heading for Europe. As a loyal officer of the crown this did not daunt him a bit. Commanding a motor boat he put to sea, and overhauling the fleeing craft. Followed then a verbal passage of arms in which great execution was scored by both sides. Victory perched promptly on the standard of the local man and he returned triumphantly with his witnesses.

**FURTHER WORD OF AMBULANCE MEN**

Lieut. Col. Kirkpatrick of the 55th is in St. John Today—Now 500 on Roll

Further particulars concerning the formation of a unit for foreign service with the St. John Ambulance Association have been received from S. A. Gidlow, general secretary of Montreal, by L. A. Acheson, divisional secretary, and instructions have been forwarded to the class secretaries in New Brunswick by Mr. Acheson. It is possible that some of the members may go forward with the third contingent, so-called, for as regards the second contingent, Mr. Gidlow writes that arrangements are about completed, and the allotted number for his district made up. The unit for active service in England or France will be known as the St. John Ambulance Bridge Overseas. The understanding is that while the unit would have military training, it would be a voluntary subscription.

**Doing Well**

There are now more than 500 recruits on the strength of the 55th. This is about half the desired number. Lieut. Col. Kirkpatrick arrived in the city this morning from St. Stephen, where, he says, recruiting has been especially encouraging. He will probably leave for Moncton tonight. The commanding officer said he had no further word as to the appointment of officers, nor had he any instructions as to when the general mobilization would take place in St. John.

**Today's Training**

The training of the 26th and the Army Service Corps today included a march-out early this morning by the former, carrying non-day rations, while the Service unit had routine drill. The 26th were to carry on tactical manoeuvres in a fairly extensive programme during the day. The Army Service members had a particularly interesting time yesterday in their route march when they paraded to Spruce Lake, there established themselves as they would on active service, with every detail complete. The day was one of the most successful carried out by the corps since going into training here.

**At Fredericton**

There are now more than 150 men of the 26th Battery of Field Artillery stationed at the exhibition buildings, Fredericton. Major Crocker said that twenty-four men were due to arrive last evening. Major W. H. Gray has received orders to recruit fifteen men for the 71st Company of the Composite Regiment at Halifax.

**At Amherst**

There are about thirty soldiers of the 22nd Battalion sick in Highland View Hospital. Most of them are suffering from severe colds but there are two or three severe cases of pneumonia.

**LEFT WILL BUT NO WITNESSES HAD SIGNED IT**

Mrs. Elizabeth Bell Therefore is Declared to Have Died Intestate—Other Probate Matters

The probate court today took up the matter of the estate of Elizabeth Bell, widow of John P. Bell, postal clerk. She made a paper writing purporting to dispose of her property but as it was not witnessed she is declared to have died intestate. She had no children but left two brothers, George D. Smith and John A. Y. Smith, and six sisters, Margaret Knowles, Isabella Campbell, Frances Smith, Jane Malcolm, Phyllis Malcolm and Eleanor Grace Pratt; the six children of a deceased sister, Mary Annie McAndrews, and the three children of Besie Smith, a deceased daughter of Mary Annie McAndrews. On the petition of the brothers and sisters resident in St. John John A. Y. Smith was appointed administrator. There is no real estate; personally \$5,124. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are proctors.

The court took up the matter of the estate of George Noble, commercial traveler. He died intestate leaving his wife, Mrs. Noble, and three sons, George Frederick, Gordon Wallace and James Willard, and one daughter Ethel May Noble. On the petition of the widow she was appointed administratrix. There is no real estate; personally \$500, and a small amount of life insurance. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are proctors. The court also had before it the matter of the estate of William Doherty, merchant tailor. He died intestate leaving his wife, Catherine Doherty; two sons, William J. and Frank J. Doherty, and two daughters Julia A. and Mary E. Doherty. On the petition of the widow she was appointed administratrix. Real estate, valued over and above mortgages, \$900; personally \$1,800 and \$3,000 life insurance payable to the widow. C. H. Ferguson is proctor.

**CHICAGOANS SEND FOOD TO GERMANS BY MAIL**

Chicago, Ills., March 24—Six thousand packages of food have been sent by parcel post by Chicagoans to friends and relatives in Germany within the last four days.

Water-proof paper boxes of food, weighing not in excess of ten pounds, have been prepared by stores ready for shipment. Each contains an assortment and there are nine assortments. The cost of the packages is from \$1.90 to \$2.15 postpaid.
