THIS WAS UP TO JANUARY

Total For Canada 3,498 Enlisted and 417 Reservists—War Had Reduced the Number of Members

The dominion government through E. A. Ackland, deputy minister of labor, has issued its fourth annual report on labor organization in Canada.

Many will find a special interest in the chapter containing a discussion of the bearing of the European war on various aspects of trade unionism, which includes also the text of deliveries of representative labor organizations in different countries with respect to war in general of having special reference to the present war.

The effect of the war on Canadian trade union growth is shown in a decrease of membership, the loss being 6,988. The estimated numerical strength of organized labor in Canada at the close of 1914 stood approximately at 106,168.

The membership for 1914 of international organizations operating in Canada was 146,482 members of non-international bodies numbered 20,685, and 4,746 belonged to independent unions.

"NATIONAL" NEW ROUTE TO WEST

General Passenger Agent Melanson Describes the Territory and Tells of Conditions

(Moncton Transcript) H. H. Melanson, General Passenger Agent of the Canadian Government Railways, returned here on Thursday by the Ocean Limited, after accompanying a party of railway officials and prominent newspaper men on the initial trip of "The National" from Toronto to Winnipeg and from Winnipeg to Toronto, in a new train via the new route through a new country, marking an epoch in the history of Canadian transportation.

The new route is via the Grand Trunk Railway Toronto to North Bay, from thence by the Ontario Government Railway to Cochrane, and from Cochrane via the Transcontinental to Winnipeg.

Mr. Melanson spoke optimistically of the important bearing of the opening of this new route upon the future of the West. He pointed out the large area of the territory served. Countless acres of new land are available in every direction.

He said that the conditions in every direction are such as to make the opening of this new route a most important factor in the development of the West.
