

S. S. Certo Opens Season-Cuban Merchants Leave for Home.

The 1924-25 potato trade between this port and Havana, Cuba, was ushered in last evening with the sailing of the steamer Certo with 10,000 bags of potatoes. The season will run now until about the end of next June, and if the optimistic references of potato growers of the province prove correct, this year's trade should set a record.

The three Cuban merchants, J. A. Palacios, Arthur Armand and Frank Suris, who conferred here yesterday with Guy G. Porter, of G. G. Porter & Co., Ltd., Perth, left last evening on their return, and Henry A. Damers, secretary-treasurer of the J. C. Manzer & Co., Ltd., expects to leave this week. Mr. Damers said today the potato trade was of considerable importance to St. John in view of the work it provided through shipments here.

Conditions in Cuba at present, Mr. Damers says, are prosperous. The presidential elections soon will be over and the country then looks forward to a big tourist trade, which lasts from December to March. The soil of Cuba, he said, was unexcelled for sugar cane growing, and despite the many uprisings and disturbances, the country was forging ahead. The population today was about 5,000,000.
