## SWISS RESENT TONE

## OF RUSSIAN NOTE

### Vorovsky Incident Brings Out Strong Condemnation from Soviet—Swiss Make Warm Reply.

Berne, May 23.—Terming Soviet Russia's note on the Vorovsky assassination "audacious and arrogant," the Swiss reply says that it would have remained unanswered but for the possibility that silence on Switzerland's part might be misconstrued. After full consideration, the reply declares, Switzerland finds "nothing for which to reproach herself."

The Swiss Government disclaims responsibility for the assassination of the Soviet ambassador.
