CONFISCATING MINING CLAIMS IN NORTH ONTARIO

Elk Lake, Ont., March 1.—Hon. Harry Mills, Ontario minister of mines, has thrown another bomb among the mining men and prospectors of Northern Ontario. This time it occurs in the form of an order in council which has the result of confiscating hundreds of mining claims in the Temagami Forest reserve for non-payment of rental.

No provision whatever is made for reinstatement and presumably all claims re-taken will be irrevocably lost to the original holders, no matter how extensive the work done or the improvements.

REFUSE AMENDMENT OF THE YAP TREATY

Washington, March 1.—Dividing virtually on party lines, the U. S. senate refused to amend the Yap treaty yesterday in the first test of strength on any question affecting the international covenants negotiated during the Washington conference. The vote was 50 to 23.

JUDGE "ENDS FARCE," PUTS END TO CASE

Sherbrooke, Que., March 1.—Canadian Press)—A case against Arthur V. Glassey, former secretary treasurer for the town of Richmond, who was charged with conversion of funds of about \$11,000, was thrown out by Judge Mulvena yesterday. Several adjournments had been secured, and when adjournment was again requested and no witnesses appeared yesterday, the court, observing that "the farce must end," dismissed the charge.

MUCH TO DO YET IN PROHIBITION FIGHT

Toronto, March 1.—"So long as the prohibition law is being broken by blind pigs, bootleggers or run-runners, or so long as any province in the dominion is not bone dry, our work is not completed," said Grand Councillor John Buchanan of this city, in his report to the grand council of Ontario, Royal Templars of Temperance, at the opening of its 39th annual session here yesterday. The financial report was regarded as satisfactory, but there was a slight decrease in the membership.

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IS VIOLATION OF THE TREATY, SAYS GERMANY

Berlin Objects to Request of Allied Commander on the Rhine for a New Drill Ground.

Berlin, March 1.—The request of General Dogoutte, commander of the allied troops on the Rhine, for a new drill ground in the Bavarian Palatinate and a small gauge railroad leading to it, has been protested by the German government on the ground that it is a violation of the peace treaty and not in accord with the Rhineland agreement, which did not obligate Germany to establish more drill places.

The government's answer to the request declares "this is only one of many violations of the peace treaty," and says that in case Germany is forced to comply with the request she will hold France liable for damages.

The ground required covers 3,0
