New York, July 6.—Returning home from a long road trip, the New York Americans made good use of their bats and twice defeated Cleveland by scores of 10 to 8 and 11 to 8. Ruth's home run with the bases full in the third inning of the first game gave New York a lead which it never lost. Meusel's hitting was another feature, as he hit a home run, a triple, two doubles and two singles in the double-header.

Chicago, July 6.—Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, announced tonight he had received an offer of \$100,000 with a provision for 50 per cent of the gate receipts, for Dempsey to box Harry Greb, light heavyweight champion, at Pittsburgh on Labor Day.

DUNDEE GETS JUDGES' DECISION OVER SHARKEY

New York, July 6.—Johnny Dundee earned the judges' decision over Jack Sharkey in a fifteen-round bout tonight. Dundee weighed 129 pounds and Sharkey 127.

Sharkey loafed along with occasional rallies until the fourteenth. Dundee did the leading after a cautious first round, but at times found it difficult to reach Sharkey, who often walked away with his back turned. During several rounds Sharkey did little except cover up and with both hands Dundee peppered him continually.

After landing often in the second and third, Dundee shot a left to the head in opening the fourth that sent Sharkey to his knees for a short count.

Sharkey came out of his spell for a brief rally in the fifth and took another lead in the seventh. Then Dundee drew blood from a cut over Sharkey's left eye. Sharkey's unwillingness to mix it caused a chorus of boos from the crowd at the finish.

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STRONG CARD FOR ARMORY MEET

Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, will be accompanied to St. John for his exhibition here in the Armory on Friday, July 14, by Larry Williams, the only sparring partner that stood the long grind of training for the Carpenter fight last year, according to a telegram received by Major C. J. Morgan last evening from T. A. Duggan, of Montreal, who is handling Dempsey's tour of Canada.

In addition, Stanislaus Zybucko, until recently world's wrestling champion, and his partner, will make the trip, as will Frankie Fleming, lightweight champion of Canada. Another prominent boxer, whose name is withheld for the present, will be on the card for the evening.

SWIMMERS COMING TO BREAK RECORDS

The women swimmers from New York are coming to St. John with the fixed determination of setting up a brand new record of Canadian swimming records and, accordingly, the course will be accurately measured. Frank White, who has charge of the swimmers while here, has arranged with G. G. Hare, the city engineer, to attend to this feature of the carnival. So when marks are set up there will be no question of quibbling as the engineer's affidavit will accompany them.

A recent issue of the Toronto Daily Star contains photographs of all the swimmers and announces that they are bound for St. John.

At a meeting last evening the Moulson Temple, K. P. Sisters, decided to distribute several hundreds of the tags for the day at various points throughout the city and these will be on sale.

THE SWIMMERS.

Frank White, who has been making the arrangements to bring noted women swimmers here from the United States for the water carnival on July 15, received a telegram last night from Charlotte Epstein, who is to chaperone the party of young ladies on their trip, announcing that they would leave New York on Wednesday morning and would arrive here at noon on Thursday.

Included in the party will be: Miss Eileen Riggan, world's and Olympic diving champion; Miss Helen Menzies, national and metropolitan high diving champion; Miss Gertrude Ederle, junior champion; Miss Charlotte Boyle, 300 yards champion; Miss Florence Brisco, junior metropolitan 100 yards champion; Miss Charlotte Boyle, holder of seven world's records; Louis Balbach, former world's champion swimmer and high diver, and Joe Moore, holder of the Canadian national skating championship.

The Pythian Sisters at a meeting last night completed their organization for

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the selling of the tags, which will commence today.

HALIFAX WORKERS ASPHYXIATED BY AMMONIA FUMES

Halifax, July 6.—Fumes escaping from an ammonia tank in the cold storage department of Mohr, Limited, chocolate and biscuit factory today reduced a small number of the 500 employees to semi-consciousness before all were able to reach the street. Murray Farnum, technical college student, was taken to the hospital, but his condition was said to be not serious. Firemen with gas masks entered the building and carried out those more seriously affected while engineers, similarly equipped, turned off the flow of ammonia fumes.

NOTED SURGEON DIES IN INDIA

Toronto, July 6.—It was announced by the Presbyterian foreign mission officers here today that a cable had been received announcing the sudden death in India of Dr. W. J. Wanless of Toronto, who was acknowledged to be one of the leading surgeons in all India. If not actually the outstanding surgeon in the Indian empire, he was the son of the late John Wanless of this city. Rev. Dr. R. P. Mackay, general foreign mission secretary, said that Dr. Wanless was so famed as a surgeon that the late Maharajah of Kohapur called him some years ago, the operation he performed saving the Indian prince's life. In return he offered to build a hospital for Dr. Wanless and pay him a generous salary, but the latter decided to continue his own work on his missionary's salary. The Maharajah referred to died about a month ago.

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Home for Incurables was held yesterday afternoon. Outside of the admission of a male and a female patient, only routine business was transacted.

RICHIBUCTO MAN ARRESTED AFTER LENGTHY CHASE

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Montreal, July 6.—As he stepped from the Canadian Challenger, when the ship docked at Vickers wharf this morning, Frank Williams, formerly of Richibucto (N. B.), was arrested by Investigator Floyd of the Canadian National Railway.

Williams is charged with breaking and entering the C. N. R. station at Kent Junction on May 8 last, and stealing \$50 in cash and an overcoat.

The arrest of Williams is the climax of a long chase. He was traced to England and communication with Scotland Yard brought out the information that he had sailed for Canada on the Canadian Challenger. The accused will be taken to Richibucto tonight.

ONTARIO BOARD PAYS \$6,189,263 IN COMPENSATION

Toronto, July 6.—In settlement of 45,191 accident claims the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Board last year paid out \$6,189,263.49 according to the annual report. This was a considerable decrease as compared with the figures of 1920, when \$7,760,145.25 was paid out on 54,851 claims as a result of accidents. The decreases are attributed largely to reduced industrial activity.

In 1921 there were 386 fatal accidents, as against 452 in the previous year. During the seven years of the operation of the workmen's compensation act, 271,607 claims have been dealt with, for which \$27,947,653.45 have been awarded.

Of the 1,187 widows drawing pensions from the board in 1920, 168 have remarried, the average period of widowhood being 2.88 years. Fifteen remarried within a year.

THREAT TO END THE COALITION

London, July 6.—Political significance is attached to a promise given by Premier Lloyd George yesterday to a Lancashire delegation, headed by the Earl of Derby, that the proposed duty of 88 1-8 per cent on fabric gloves from Germany would not be enforced until the claims made against it by Lancashire interests had been fully examined.

Meanwhile the House of Commons will not be asked to approve of the order made under the safeguarding of industries act for the imposition of the duty. Unionist members of the House of

Commons are already protesting against the premier's decision, which is regarded by them as a concession to the free traders, and they threaten to end the coalition if the cabinet reverses its decision to enforce the order.
