INTERESTING LECTURE AT CANADIAN CLUB LUNCHEON
An interesting lecture was given last evening at the Canadian Club luncheon by Rabbi C. A. Press, Ph.D. He sketched the history of the Jewish people, their banishment from the land of their birth, the persecution they have endured in other lands, and their ideals today. In the absence of A. M. Belding, the president, H. A. Porter, vice-president, was in the chair. A letter from Sir George E. Foster on the League of Nations was read, as was a communication from the Emma Fiske Memorial Fund, which stated that it was the intention to raise a fund of from \$500 to \$1,000, and a prize of \$50 would be given to the pupil of the St. John high school showing the greatest proficiency in the French language. A letter addressed to the Canadian and Rotary Clubs and the St. John Council of Women, asking that these organizations unite in securing the penalty of the lash for wife beating, was read.
