Baseball
May Have New Grounds.
Halifax may have new baseball and football grounds next year. Mayor Bligh and Alderman Martin have been appointed by the exhibition commission to enquire into the cost of beautifying the grounds with the race track enclosure at the exhibition. It is proposed to have the grounds levelled and made into athletic grounds, but more particularly for baseball, with portable stands and every accommodation for patrons of the game.

Jap Finishes Third.
Yamada, the Japanese billiard expert, won third money in the world's professional championship 182 ball line tournament by defeating Morringstar in the play-off in their tie in New York. The score was 600 to 220. Third place earned a money prize of \$1,200, fourth \$800.

Athletic
One-Legged Man's Long Walk.
Spokane, Wash., Nov. 24.—Charles S. Galbreath, a twenty-one-year-old Spokane youth, using a crutch to supplant a leg amputated above the knee, has started from here on a 1,200 mile walk to San Francisco. Those who know him have no doubts about his ability to accomplish the feat, for he has distinguished himself as an athlete, particularly at tennis, in his leg which he uses the most as a support. He is a strong swimmer and plays basketball well. Galbreath, who is the son of a prominent Spokane architect, expects to reach San Francisco in forty days.

The A. A. U. of Canada
Toronto, Nov. 25.—The annual meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, attended by delegates from every province in the dominion, was featured by President Merrick's address, a fine review of the work of the year.

In connection with the Olympic games it had been proposed that the various teams from Great Britain and the colonies should assemble in London for future Olympic games and form an empire team as the result of competitions there, the empire council having control of the affairs. With part of this proposition Canada was able to agree, but to the extent of sinking her dignity or limiting her representation in Olympic games to those successful in the empire trials.

"We have now," said Mr. Merrick, "a total of some 1,200 clubs in our seven branches, embracing an individual membership of close to 100,000 young men." Doctor Johnson, speaking for the maritime provinces, said their greatest difficulties were with professional hockey and baseball, with now a threat of professional soccer.

The track and field championships of Canada were applied for by several provinces, but were awarded to British Columbia, without a division. They will probably be held about the end of August next.

Doctor Fred J. Ties of Montreal was elected president unanimously and the principle of rotation for the branches in this office was approved, but not decided a matter of binding nature. Doctor H. B. BIG CHANGE IN NEW YORK UNDERWORLD

East Side Resorts Quiet, Dens Closed, Habitués Seeking Cover
EFFECT OF RECENT TRIALS

Gangsters and Crooks Disrupted By Hand of the Law—Gunsmen Tell of Themselves—Rose Is to Write a Book
(New York Herald)

Second avenue and Chinatown are as peaceful and safe as Hanoi square. "Guns" have been driven from their haunts, and wherever they are, they are being closed. Zelig's hand is scattered. His allies have made peace with the law. "Jack" Sirraco, "Paul" Kelly, a labor union president, "Jimmy" Kelly, who has made a model of obedience to the law.

These are results of the conviction of Charles Becker and the four "gunmen" of the Federal grand jury. Sought Revenge, Stain.
Zelig's lieutenant, "Lefty Louie" has been convicted of murder. "Jimmy Kelly" as the underworld knows "Vicenzo" Vacco, has abandoned his feud with Sirraco, whose saloon in Chinatown is as orderly as any in Broadway. "Jimmy" Kelly, reputed promoter of the attack of Zelig, "Lefty" and "Whitney" upon Sirraco in Chinatown last June, in which "Lefty" was wounded, a proprietor of a little saloon in Hester street.

"Paul" Kelly, as Paul Vaccarello long has been known, no longer is a leader of men of the class. He is president of the underworld, a proprietor of a little restaurant in East Fourteenth street, he shuns violence, and is devoted much time to conventions of labor organizations. 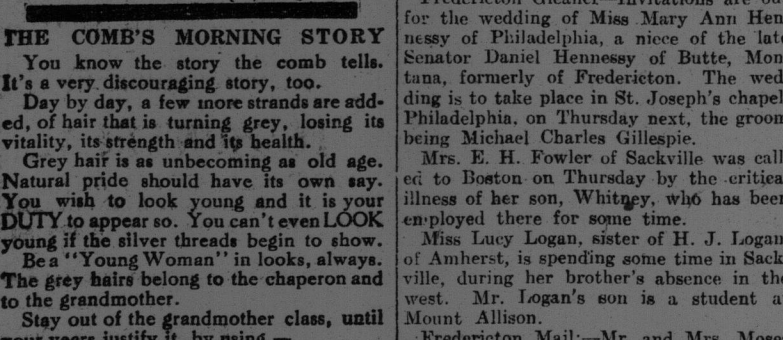
