PIN SELLER CIRCLES EARTH SEVEN TIMES Employed 62 Years by One Firm, and Has Many Descendants. Denver, June 27.—Fifteen children, 25 grand-children, 44 great-grandchildren and a traveler for one firm for sixty-two years, is the record of N. W. Fleisig, who attended the United Commercial Travelers' convention in this city.

Fleisig has been around the world seven times, served through the Civil war and escaped from Andersonville prison. He started traveling when he was eleven years old. He ran away from his home on a farm in Missouri, went to Charleston, S.C., and shipped on a slave vessel for South Africa. He reached England, went to work with William Crowley & Sons, of Redditch, and has been with them, selling pins and needles, since that time.
