SAD TALE OF DOMESTIC UNHAPPINESS

Police Court Proceedings Develop Drestressing Conditions Which Mrs. John W. Allen Had to Combat for Years

There were unexpected developments at the police court this morning when the case of John W. Allen, charged with getting a ticket to Fredericton under false pretences, was brought up for examination.

A. M. Belding testified that Allen had told him he lived in Fredericton with his wife and children and worked in a mill. He said he had got drunk and came to St. John and wanted help to get back. He would return the money, he said, at the end of the week. Mr. Belding went out with him and purchased a ticket and gave it to Allen. "I was at noon the next day," Mr. Belding discovered later that Allen did not go to Fredericton that night.

Mr. Belding pointed out that the next day was Sunday. He added that several other persons had been victimised in the same way.

Thomas Christian testified that he gave Allen two dollars on Aug. 31st, to purchase a ticket to Fredericton where he worked in a mill. He appealed to Mr. Christian for his father's (Allen's) name and pocket the money and gave an O. U. to her.

The next witness was Mrs. Allen herself, who testified that she and her husband had been married for twelve years, that one of her children was being kept by her brother-in-law, and that she had been earning her own living for years. Within the last week she had lost a place because Allen came around drunk and annoyed the people. He had also threatened her and she was afraid of him and had appealed to Chief Booth for help. She had bought her own bread in ten years.

At the conclusion of her evidence Judge Ritchie adjourned the case until the 12th before the supreme court. He was remanded for three days.
