

FEAR DEFICIT AT ORPHANAGE ABOVE \$27,000

Protestant Institution Board Discusses Situation—204 Children in Home

Grave fear was expressed at the meeting of the directors of the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage yesterday afternoon that the maintenance fund deficit must be further increased this month. Only a very liberal response on the part of the supporters of the institution at the present critical period would prevent the necessity of advancing the debt beyond \$27,000, its present figure. The meeting yesterday was held at the home in the Menzies road in order that the directors might make a thorough inspection of the premises and see the children. There were 17 members present and they expressed themselves as greatly pleased with the conduct of the institution and everything connected with it.

SIX ARE ADOPTED

Reports submitted were chiefly of routine nature. The children's health was reported to be excellent. During the month 18 children had left the institution, six being adopted and others going to their nearest surviving relatives. A curious fact noted was that there was a greater demand for girls for adoption than for boys, and it was stated that the accommodation for boys between the ages of four and 14 was full to overflowing and there were many on the waiting list. During the month 32 children were taken into the orphanage and the total number at the end of the month was 204.

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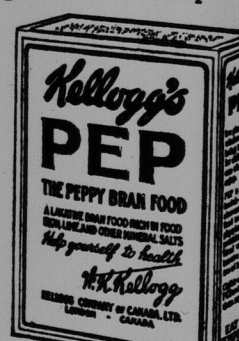
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VISITING RIVERSIDE FROM ERIN'S ISLE
