## SELECTIVE HEARING

(N. Y. Herald.)

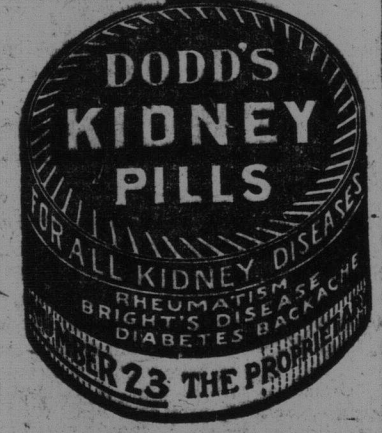
An English paper has been printing  
some interesting notes about "selective  
hearing in sleep," by which is meant the  
faculty that we have of sleeping through  
certain sounds and of being aroused in-  
fallibly by certain lesser sounds. One  
writer illustrates it: "I have often sleep-  
soudly at the side of a roaring baby,  
but when the baby was ill and I was  
responsible for him, the slightest little  
cry of pain or sigh used to rouse me at  
once. That was because I knew my re-  
sponsibility and thought about it before  
going to sleep. As an experiment, I  
would suggest this: Take a usually  
sound sleeper, and in an ordinary quiet  
condition which the country people ex-  
plain by the fact that we are never wholly  
asleep, so far as questions of probable  
peril or recognized duty are concerned,  
just as most of us can awake ourselves  
at or near a certain time by fixing the  
mind on that hour before falling asleep,  
so danger, circumstance or duty that we  
had on our minds before going to sleep  
will, if it arises, infallibly arouse us.  
Relatively to that circumstance, the  
sleeper is not really asleep. He is in the  
condition which the country people de-  
scribe as 'sleeping with one eye open.'  
At any rate, we all have one ear open  
when asleep."

All of course, except children, who  
sleep absolutely. It is next to impos-  
sible to wake a healthy child except by  
shaking him. He is dead to sound while  
asleep. "The same is true of intoxicated  
adults, whose usual sober reserve of  
wakefulness, even in the state of sleep,  
is destroyed by alcohol. The soundness  
with which a child can sleep is amazing.  
One of the healthiest and most normal  
of children whom the Nomad inspired  
was, twelve years old, was once left  
by her father and mother in an apart-  
ment alone for a while at night, a neigh-  
bor being requested to look after her.  
She locked herself in and went to bed  
and slept soundly. By and by her par-  
ents returned and found that the only  
key that they had to the house was on  
the inside of the door. It was neces-  
sary to awaken the child. Bells were  
rung and doors were hammered. No re-  
sult. The room which the child occu-  
pied had a door (locked) with a very  
narrow transom over it, opening into  
the hall. The transom was opened and  
shouted through. No response. Boots,  
shoes, boxes stove lids, tin pans, were  
thrown through the transom and upon  
the floor of the room surrounding the  
bed. The child slept serenely on. In  
order to open the door it was necessary  
for a boy to climb through the narrow  
transom and leap down upon the floor;  
and when the child was shaken softly  
and wonderingly, and said, "Why, what do  
you want?" There was the real sleep.  
Our usual slumber is only a half-sleep-  
ing and half-waking.  
Thus a sleeping person may be in-  
sensible to words spoken by people in gen-  
eral, but will be awakened instantly by  
the voice of wife or husband. Or it may  
be the other way around, depending on  
the mental attitude—the voice of the  
husband or wife may not wake, but that  
of any other person will. Toward one

the waking state is maintained. The  
good of an alarm clock is that we

dition they must get back somewhat  
nearly to the condition of the child.

nervous prostration. It meant only that  
the victim must return to a condition  
so near to nature that it would be pos-
