EPWORTH LEAGUE

Closing Sessions of a Grand Gathering.

Very Able Address by Rev. E. N. Baker on the Subject of Missions.

The E. L. of C. E. annual convention in London closed last night. They began their second day with a sunrise prayer meeting in Wesley Hall, in charge of Rev. E. B. Lancelotti.

Among the papers read was one on "Organization" by Miss Mai D'Arville, and "From Junior to the Senior—How and when," by Miss Emma Stevenson, both of Glencoe.

Delegates in large numbers arrived yesterday morning among them being: Miss Jackson, Rev. H. W. and Mrs. Crews and Geo. F. James, Chatham; A. M. Vail and Rev. J. Baird, Newbury; Mrs. E. Beattie, Highgate; Rev. E. Brock, secretary, Chatham; Rev. C. P. Wells, Tilbury; Rev. E. N. Baker, Chatham; C. Munroe, Rev. G. F. Kerr, Thamesville; Oliver Peangley, Newbury.

At the afternoon session four excellent papers on "Ideal Officers of the Senior League" were read. The first on "The President," was read by Rev. W. A. Smith, in the absence of Dr. Quackenbush, of Henlein; the second, on "The Recording Secretary," by Miss R. Keenleyside, of London; the third, on "The Corresponding Secretary," by Geo. James, of Chatham, and the fourth, on "The Treasurer," by Miss N. Gibson, of Brownsville.

After animated discussion of the above, four bright papers were delivered on "Missions." The subject being divided under the following heads:—"Devotional," by Wm. Jeffrey, of Chatham; "Literary," by L. J. Rycraft, of Ridgeway; "Social," by Mrs. Nichol, of St. Thomas, and "Business," by Miss L. Jackson, of Chatham.

CHATHAMITES PROMINENT.

At the evening session Dr. Thornton presided. It opened with a musical service. F. Stephenson, of Toronto, was called upon, and addressed the meeting on the "Y. P. Forward Movement for Missions." Rev. E. N. Baker, of this city, followed with a rousing talk upon missions, pointing out to and impressing upon his many hearers the inestimable importance of mission work and the benefits to accrue from keeping "Missions first." There was work at home and abroad in the cause of Christ and for the uplifting and ennobling of mankind in which each one could do his share, and was expected to do it; each could find a vast deal to do in his or her own limited sphere of life, but there lay vastly more beyond. At home, and in the common walks of life each was responsible for doing both by example and precept whatever good he or she could accomplish; but the mission field, the active laborers in it, demanded the prayers, contributions and hearty co-operation. To give these was no less an imperative duty than to cultivate the home field of labor, and it would not be doubted that those men and women who interested themselves in missions and "missions first," could be depended upon to do their duty in matters nearer home.

The delegates nearly all returned home to-day.

THE MARKETS.

(Via L. J. Atwater's Private Wire.)

Chicago, March 9.—The wheat market to-day has been very deceptive to the general trade. Its appearance has been weak and seemed to require constant support of bulls to prevent a break, yet some advance has been recorded as there was sufficient support to absorb offerings and not much aggressiveness in the part of bears.

The news was favorable to holders. Paris was steady to 30 centimes higher, Liverpool irregular and Antwerp 12 1/2 centimes lower.

The bearish attitude of traders caused further selling for short account, and the clique bought the wheat, otherwise there were no special features. It is our opinion that the market will require constant support from the clique in order to sustain present prices.

Corn has been dull but firm, possibly influenced by the approach of the government report, which will show the March reserves in farmers' hands, and which is generally expected will be bullish.

Oats have been firm. Clearances were 23,000 bushels, and a good export demand is reported at the seaboard. Provisions have been strong, pork advancing 12 1/2 cts. per bbl; lard and ribs 30c. per hundred.
