BANK CONTRIBUTIONS To note circulation gold reserve To be deposited in the vaults of Royal

Trust Co.

Toronto, Aug. 27.—In the vaults of the Boyal Trust Co. at Montreal will be deposited the contributions of all the Canadian banks to the note circulation gold reserve which was provided in the new Bank Act passed at the last session of the Dominion Parliament. This was the decision arrived at by the Canadian Bankers' Association at a meeting in the assembly room of the Bank of Toronto yesterday.
