**KING AND QUEEN GIVEN A
GREAT RECEPTION IN IRELAND**

DUBLIN, July 10.—The first day of the visit to Ireland of King Edward and Queen Alexandra was a great success. The weather was fine and the city gave the sovereigns a royal welcome. Both wore the national color of Ireland, the King a green necktie, and the Queen a moss green and mauve toque.

His Majesty delivered brief speeches at the various functions of the day. He expressed his grateful thanks of the warm reception accorded himself and the Queen, and congratulated the country upon the progress and prosperity indicated by what he had seen. His stay would be much shorter than he would wish, but he intended to make most of it, the prosperity of the country and the happiness and contentment of the people being objects very near to the hearts of both himself and the Queen.

Their Majesties arrived here from Kingston this afternoon. After visiting the exhibition they passed in procession through the streets of Dublin to the vice regal lodge, and everywhere dense crowds of people accorded them

a hearty reception. The Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and his Countess, gave a garden party at the Lodge in honor of their majesties. Invitations had been sent out broadcast and consequently thousands had an opportunity to see the King and Queen. After this function the Royal pair returned to Kingston in a motor car, being greeted everywhere with hearty demonstrations of good will.

A rumor was current here tonight to the effect that portion of the state regalia valued at \$250,000, which was stolen from Dublin Castle recently and for the return of which the government has offered a reward of \$5,000, was removed by an important official who has disappeared. King Edward has written a letter to Earl Aberdeen asking him to express to the Irish people His Majesty's and the Queen's warmest appreciation of the reception accorded them.

**A LOT OF NEW ROLLING
STOCK FOR THE I. C. R.**

OTTAWA, July 10.—There was another meeting of the cabinet this afternoon, the last for the present week, when nearly \$1,000,000 worth of contracts for locomotives and rolling stock for the Intercolonial was passed. The contracts for locomotives, principally heavy freight engines, were divided between the Kingston locomotive works and the Montreal locomotive works. Then there was a large contract for freight cars, which will go between Rhodes, Curry & Co., of Amherst, N. S., and the Coburg Car Company.

Like the western roads, the government line feels the scarcity of cars very much, and the only difficulty now in the way of a good supply is that all of the works are too busy to fill a rush order.

The manager of the Intercolonial Railway has appointed Henry Holgate, C. E., of Montreal, as their representative in connection with the dispute with the Halifax and other freight handlers. The men have not yet named their man.

**YOUNG PEOPLES CHRISTIAN
UNION IN SESSION**

BOSTON, July 10.—The nineteenth national convention of the Young People's Christian Union opened its fourth session in the Second Universalist Church on Columbus Avenue to night. Over 500 delegates are in attendance representing 230 local unions. Addresses of welcome were delivered by Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., and Rev. Dr. Samuel A. Eliot, President of the American Unitarian Association.

President Perkins, responded to the words of welcome and delivered his annual address.

The convention will organize for business tomorrow.

**MAN AT COGNAC WAS
KILLED BY LIGHTNING**

MONCTON, N. B., July 10.—Word was brought to the city today that a man named Colmher was struck and killed by lightning at Cognac during the electrical storm at that place yesterday. No particulars of the accident have been obtained. It is said Colmher belonged to Cognac river.

Three young men, W. Cormier, J. Wier and J. Donnelly were arraigned in the police court today on a charge of being concerned in the robbery of one William Andrews. On June 24 last Jas. Flavin was arrested for stealing Andrews' purse. He was afterwards convicted and sentenced by Judge Forbes to five years in the penitentiary.

Andrews alleged others were concerned in beating and robbing him, and Chief Rideout has since been quietly working on the case, resulting in the arrest of three young men.

Andrews, in his evidence today, stated that in the purse stolen there was a \$5 gold piece, and Chief Rideout discovered a barroom where one of the men under arrest is said to have presented such a coin. The parties were all drinking together. The examination will be continued tomorrow.

**TWO ARRESTS IN THE
THACKER ASSAULT CASE**

HALIFAX, N. S., July 10.—Two Royal Canadian artillerymen have been arrested suspected of having committed the assault on Major Thacker. They are Englishmen. Masks were found in their kit, which it is thought they used to disguise themselves in making the attack.

One of the prisoners was heard to remark that he would knock off the major's head when he got a chance.

**BOY CHARGED WITH
KILLING A PLAYMATE**

NEW LONDON, July 10.—Ten year old Frank Morgan is locked up in the county jail on the charge of murder. He is accused of killing his playmate, Ivy L. Rogers, with a shotgun last Friday. Young Morgan will have a preliminary hearing at Ledyard Monday. It is alleged that the two boys quarrelled during a fishing excursion and that the Morgan boy shot at his friend inflicting terrible injuries from which he died in a local hospital. The parents of the boys are well known.

**OUTBREAK OF FIRE
BROKE UP THE FUNERAL**

MONMOUTH, Me., July 10.—This town was given a real fire scare this afternoon when the business section was in grave danger. The blaze destroyed two small wooden structures and four carloads of hay and caused a total loss of \$3,000. At one time ten buildings were burning and hady of the larger ones, including the Monmouth House, Main Central R. R. station and several stores, got beyond control. It is believed the business section would have been wiped out. The buildings burned were a storehouse owned by S. K. Blake and Dr. H. M. Blake and a lumber storehouse owned by Simon Clough.

The fire was placed under control by the aid of a hand-tub and buckets before the arrival of fire men and apparatus sent from Lewiston. Lewis Fuller, of West Gardiner, was helped by the hand-tub and Joseph Tutts of this place was overcome by smoke and heat. Both recovered later.

A funeral which was in progress when the fire broke out was deserted except by the mourners and minister.
