## RECORDS OF OLD SAILING VESSELS

The two express Cunarders are just now busy record-breaking. They have gained the British Government subsidy, and have done speed in excess of that required to gain this. For many years now express steamers have been on the best sailing-ship speed record, but this was by no means always so, and it is perhaps interesting to recall some of the notable performances under sail.

The ocean-going sailing-ship, which has for some four hundred and fifty years been a great—perhaps the greatest—factor in the civilization of the world, has been thrust aside by the steamship. The spreading white wings of the steamship are now a common sight, and it is perhaps interesting to recall some of the notable performances under sail.

She came from Hong Kong to New York in 207 days. Fifty years ago this would have been thought nothing for a vessel of her size. The little Thermopylae, a third of her tonnage, once sailed from Foo Chow to the English Channel in ninety-one days. ### PASSAGE TO AUSTRALIA.

In her day the Thermopylae, the Australian trader already mentioned, was considered a wonder, she was quite a small vessel, but did the passage from the Channel to Melbourne in sixty days on her first voyage. She credited with a day's run of 320, but in this case the length of the day is not given.

The flying ship or canoe of the Pacific is said to sail at a speed of at least thirty miles an hour. Great Britain's old line-of-battle ships, the eighteenth century could, with pressure be made to drive seven or eight knots. Very wonderful work was done by the old "Blackwall" ships of Green, Smith, Wigram and others, which took the place of the old East India Company ships when the monopoly of that celebrated corporation came to an end. An abstract log of one of them, the Hotspur, has just appeared. This vessel, though "frigate built," and in no sense a clipper, made a passage from the Channel to Hong Kong in eighty days, which is particularly good work.

### SMALLER CREWS.

Many of Green's ships did as good work as this, and all this East India fleet made particularly good average passages. This was owing to the thorough knowledge of the winds possessed by their commanders, and also to the large crews they carried, a watch of twenty-five persons being nothing out of the way, so that they could be sailed, and pressed, like yachts in a race. No such crews are carried now.

Even in the sea-clipper days a ship's company was only thirty, or, say, fourteen in a watch. Now, large sailing-ships of at least three times the tonnage of these "frigate built" ships and China clippers only carry a crew of twenty-five to thirty, and the seamen of today are not to be compared with the men of thirty years ago.

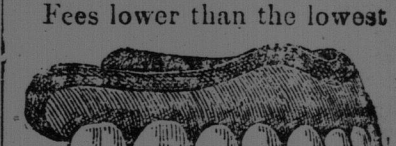
