Foreigners, Nov. 2.—La Faveur, French corvette, arrived on Tuesday from Cherbourg, especially by the French Minister of Marine, M. de Brialmont, with a complimentary letter to our Naval Commander-in-Chief, Admiral Sir Charles Knowles, etc., etc.

On the division of the county under the provisions of the Reform Bill, he became a candidate for the northern division, but was defeated by Sir John Tyrrell and Mr. Baring—a circumstance which was understood induced Lord Melbourne, as a reward for his long and consistent services, to recall him to the upper ranks of the peerage, by the title of Baron Western, of Hereford.

Lord Western was never married. He had no brother, and the title is extinct. His only daughter, Miss Western, was married to the Hon. Charles Lyndoch, a member of the House of Commons.

DEATH OF THE DEAN OF LIMERICK.—This venerable and learned ecclesiastic who has been long in a declining state of health, died on Sunday last, in the 84th year of his age, at his residence near Rathgoun, county Kildare. The Very Rev. Arthur John Preston when Dean of Kildare, was promoted to the Deanery of Limerick, and instituted at the Cathedral, on the 17th of August 1859. The Deanery of Limerick now vacant, is not valued at more than £1,000 a year, but there are attached to the office the patronage of Munster and Bruce vicarages, the perpetual Curacy of Cahincherry, and six minor parishes in the Cathedral.

MOULMEIN.—EXTRAORDINARY CONVERSIONS.—The Religious Herald for the month, published in the Burmese language by the American missionaries here, contains an account of the conversion to Christianity of 2000 Karens, in the Province of Arrakan, the result of the missionary labors of the Rev. Mr. Abbott within less than a year past. Truly on such a subject like the friends to Christian missions may well rejoice, and from its encouraging to persevering exertions. Mention is also made of the benevolent gift of a thousand rupees by Major Broadfoot to the missionaries at Tavoy and Mergui, with a view to commence the good work of education and the propagation of truth among the miserable inhabitants of the Selong islands on the coast of Mergui. The work has been begun.
