

### WATER BOARD RECOMMENDS NEW MAIN TO HOSPITAL

At the meeting of the water and sewerage board last evening Dr. Daniel, M. P., and Ald. McGoldrick representing the general public hospital, asked for better service for the institution, and the board decided to ask the municipal engineer to provide the money to put in a new main, etc. The pulp mill and the St. John Boat Club's complaint were again discussed and a large amount of routine business was dealt with.

Ald. Likely presided, and there were present Ald. Smith, Wigmore, Sprout, Scully, Hayes, White, and Russell, with the common clerk and the city engineer.

Dr. Daniel, M. P., was heard. He said he and Ald. McGoldrick were a committee from the general hospital to bring up the matter of securing a more effective water supply. The present 4 inch pipe which supplied the water for domestic and fire purposes was put in when the hospital was half its present size. They were afraid that if a fire occurred the results might be disastrous to the inmates of the hospital, most of whom would be unable to help themselves.

The city engineer recommended the installation of an 18 inch main for fire purposes, leaving the present pipe to supply the water for domestic purposes.

Would Cost \$2400.

He estimated the cost of providing the necessary water service at \$2400 including a stand pipe in the rotunda with hose and fittings.

Ald. McGoldrick spoke along the same lines.

Ald. White moved that the Board send a communication to the Municipal Council requesting them to issue debentures to cover the cost, and have the work done as soon as possible. This was adopted.

Stanley Elkin was heard in connection with a previous request for an installation of a six inch main to supply the sprinkler system of the Maritime Nail Works. He said his company had extended the main on its own account, and thought they were entitled to a refund of \$302.42. The matter was referred to the engineer to report back.

Geo. E. Day brought up the matter of directing the sewerage away from the St. John Boat Club house. He said the engineer's estimate of the cost of securing rights-of-way was too high. He presented a petition signed by about 300 rate payers requesting that the location of the sewers be changed.

No action was taken.

### WATER BOARD RECOMMENDS NEW MAIN TO HOSPITAL

He said the houses on the west side were built on crib structures, open to the tide, and that they could construct a sewer in the middle of the street, or in the rear of the lots.

The chairman said there was urgent need of a better sewer service on the street.

Ald. Russell thought the question might be left in abeyance. The C. P. R. would probably buy all the property on the west side of the street.

The matter was referred to the chairman and the engineer.

In reference to Dr. Melvin's letter pointing out the need of a sewer on the Strait Shore Road, the engineer reported that it would cost about \$10,000 to provide the necessary equipment.

No action was taken.

The engineer recommended the construction of a water main to R. G. Murray's property on Marsh Road. This was adopted.

The engineer recommended that the water rates on the property of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart be reduced 25%. This was approved.

Already Ordered Pipes.

Ald. Scully wanted to know whether there was a leakage in the water pipe to Partridge Island. There was a shortage of water on Lancaster Heights.

The Engineer—I have heard no complaints.

Ald. Russell asked what had been done about May Robinson who had squatted on civic property at Robinson's reservoir.

The engineer said he had tried to get the recorder to act on the order to eject the woman, but nothing had been done. She had been offered \$125 to leave, because it would cost more to get the lawyers to move her.

On motion of Ald. Hayes the engineer was instructed to report on the advisability of installing a catch basin on Stanley street, near City Road.

The engineer was instructed to place a catch basin at the head of North Market wharf between the railway tracks, and another at the corner of Watson and Charlotte streets, West Side.

The chairman said Stetson and Cutler were taking their water away from the Mispic pulp mill and the city would have to do something to protect its property. He thought the city should give Mr. Cutler an option to buy for \$30,000. Mr. Cutler would probably sell to an organized company to start a paper mill, employing 130 hands.

A committee was appointed to interview Mr. Cutler and see if some arrangements could be made to start work at the mill again.

man and the attendant circumstances. Patrolman Jas. H. Gossline, next to the door of the room, saw the prisoner driving out the Marsh Road with the detective and the prisoner and finding the prisoner's revolver.

This closed the case for the crown.

Witness for Defence.

Pasquale Ferraro was then called by the defence to give evidence regarding the conduct of the witness Minnie Jones while in Lynn, Mass.

He stated that he was a barber living at Lynn, Mass., and was married to a sister of Minnie Jones. He met her latter four and a half years ago. She was married to an American named Grigor and lived with him. She was known to the police and had been arrested for drunkenness and street walking.

The attorney general—I object to this method of taking away a woman's character.

His Honor—I see no object to the question except to discredit the witness.

Mr. Baxter—That is just it. We purpose to show that one of the Crown's witnesses perjured herself. The attorney general finally withdrew his objection.

The witness said he knew of the charge because he was in the court room. He knew that Minnie Jones left her husband and went to New York with a man named Randolph. As far as he knew the reputation of the woman in Lynn was not less than that of a common prostitute.

To the attorney general witness said he came to St. John on a vacation with no intention of taking part in this trial. He had been in contact with the police twice during the past year. He was sent to the home of correction for firing a revolver at his wife and was fined \$50 and given three months for violating the liquor laws. He was dismissed on a charge of larceny.

The attorney general—Then, with a reputation like that you presume to come down here and give evidence regarding a woman's character.

Mr. Baxter (in re-examination)—Why did you shoot your wife?

Mr. Baxter—That is a very good reason.

Address by Counsel.

The counsel for the defence then addressed the jury. He pointed out the seriousness of the charge and the heavy responsibility which lay on the jury as well as on the advocate. The penalty of the crime charged was one which made reparation impossible after it was carried out. He feared that the jury might be swayed in the wrong direction by the eloquence of the attorney general and asked them to consider the unfortunate plight of the prisoner. A stranger in this country probably unfamiliar with our institutions. He pointed out that the presence of revolvers in the house was nothing unusual. Regarding the evidence of Julia Jones, he said that the girl was too young for them to lay very much weight on her testimony. Her recollection was not clear and apart from the different versions she gave, she said that the prisoner laughed when he said that Saracusa would never walk out again. It was a joke and showed no signs of premeditation. Another witness spoke of a threat to cut Saracusa's throat but he admitted frankly that he considered it a joke.

"Gentlemen," he said, "we do not question that the deceased came to his death by the hand of the prisoner, but we do claim that the crime was not a premeditated one, done with malice aforethought. The boy who told of what seemed to be a quarrel could not understand the language in which they were talking and when asked as to the loudness of the voices he only used a tone such as he should have used in giving his evidence.

Do you think it fair that a man should go to his death on such evidence as to the loudness of the voices? I found it necessary to take a course which I would not have adopted if the case had not been one of capital importance. You heard her evidence and can you believe that she told the truth? If this woman, a common harlot, was playing with the passions of these men of fiery southern blood, if the deceased, tortured prisoner with sneering laughter, can you not understand how in a flash the revolver was pulled and the fatal act performed? That is the way I believe it happened. If he had planned a murder he had lots of better opportunities. You must find the prisoner guilty of manslaughter, but you cannot from the evidence find him guilty of murder. If the unfortunate prisoner was guilty of murder there is enough suffering in the rest of his life to punish him, even if the verdict is manslaughter. In thinking of your verdict, think as if it were your own last moment, and, gentlemen, think in mercy as you would wish mercy extended to you.

Attorney General Hazen.

The attorney general in opening his address said that the admission of the counsel for the defence was unnecessary for him to lay stress on the fact that Diego Saracusa came to his death at the hand of the prisoner. Regarding a remark of the counsel for the defence, he said: "God forbid that I or any other crown officer should urge a jury to bring a verdict of guilty against an innocent man, or to bring a verdict for a greater crime than that of which he was guilty."

Reference had been made that the prisoner is a foreigner. While it is our boast that every man in this country will receive justice, yet to make life save we must insist that the law be enforced and a foreigner cannot claim more of mercy than a British subject."

Taking up the legal aspect of the case, the attorney general submitted that the crime was committed with malice aforethought, and therefore was murder. He pointed to the evidence to show that the act was not committed in any sudden gust of passion. In cold blood the prisoner had slayed the man whose hospitality he had enjoyed.

Taking up the various threats made by the prisoner, the attorney general claimed that they were no jokes, but evidence of a determined intention to put Saracusa out of the way.

Speaking of the Jones woman, the attorney general asked if she was a woman of loose character what claim had the prisoner on her and what excuse was this for his conduct. Tracing the conduct of the prisoner before the shooting, he asked if there was any evidence of passion, and quoted authorities to show that there was nothing to justify the reduction of the verdict from murder to manslaughter. He closed with an appeal to the jury to find a verdict as dictated by their sense of duty.

The Judge's Charge.

In his charge to the jury His Honor said: "The admission by the counsel for the defence regarding the killing makes me feel shorter than it otherwise would have been. I must, however, explain to you the distinction between murder and manslaughter. If the evidence and the circumstances seem to call for it you can find a verdict of manslaughter instead of murder, although there is but one count in the charge. This does not give the jury liberty to regulate the punishment. You have nothing to do with the punishment, it is a matter for the judge alone. The judge cannot exercise his own discretion and neither can the jury. Your duty is simply to decide whether the prisoner is guilty of murder or manslaughter.

The jury retired with the result above stated.
