HEARTS TRUMPS AT MILADY'S ST. VALENTINE'S FUNCTION

Shop windows of the stationer, the florist, and the confectioner—yes, even the grocer—now tell us that the fourteenth of February is almost upon us. We realize that this is a good time to give an afternoon tea, a luncheon, a dinner or an evening affair, and we are indulging our brains to devise something new in the way of decorations and refreshments for we've about decided to entertain.

The dining room is to be the most attractive place in the house. Smilax will be draped about the chandelier and will edge the centerpiece on the table. Little red cardboard hearts and cupid's galore will be hung from the green smilax, draped from the chandelier to each table corner, and scattered over the snowy table or lunch cloth. Candle shades are to be made of white crepe paper, with tiny red hearts pasted on them.

For the centerpiece a round box covered with white crepe paper, with red hearts and cupid's galore pasted on it, will be filled with valentines for each guest. To each valentine a red ribbon is to be fastened, which will lead to each place, where it may be attached to tiny paper holders filled with candies or nuts, or else it may serve to tie a red and a white carnation together as a favor for each guest. The place cards may be red hearts with the name written in white ink, or vice versa.

Hearts and smilax may be used to decorate everywhere in all available places. These hearts may be made at home, cut from stiff red paper or cardboard, and saved for use another year, and they may range from the tiniest affairs to 16 or 18 inches in size.

Good and appropriate games are hearts, ring games, the writing of original valentines, and forfeits. "Tail by cards for the game of hearts may be red hearts, and prizes wrapped in white tissue paper covered with the smallest hearts and tied with red ribbons.

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BROAD BLOOMS CHEER CHILDREN

Thousands of Little Sufferers Made Happy by Thoughtful Act of Lady Decies Mother Huge Vangards.

New York, N. Y., Feb. 11.—Thousands of dollars' worth of spring flowers which decorated St. Bartholomew's church at the wedding of Lord Decies and Miss Vivien Gould, on Tuesday, were sent to hundreds of little sufferers in the city hospitals and other children's ward. Youngsters in the lives of the recipients.

Two big vanloads of blossoms were sent to the New York branch of the National Fruit and Flower Guild for distribution by the courtesy of Mrs. George Gould, mother of the bride, who repeated the plan she put into effect at the time of her eldest daughter's marriage to Anthony Drexel, Jr.

At the Drexel wedding crowds of women souvenir hunters swarmed down upon Mrs. G. E. Paul, secretary of the guild, and carried away bunches of the flowers until prevented by the arrival of 12 policemen. This time, by the kindness of Alexander MacConnell, the floral decorator, the flowers were sent directly from the church to the headquarters of the guild, at No. 70 Fifth avenue, where the secretary, with assistants, prepared them for distribution.

The rooms of the guild were transformed into filled arcades of flowers, and space in halls and offices was required for the reception of more. There were big bunches of yellow Forsythia, Japanese primroses, white lilies, hawthorn, daisies, Bermuda, Japanese and calla lilies, and the white bride roses which decorated the altar, which, by the way, were the only bunches of that nature used.

It was a task of no small importance to divide the flowers into lots and prepare them for their destinations. One wagonload was sent to New York hospital children's ward. Youngsters in pretty pink aprons voiced their delight in many ways.

From New York hospital the wagon went to the Christie street house at No. 129 Christie street, where it seemed a telephatic communication had been received telling the children of the kindergarten and day nursery of the gift which was at hand.

To the east side school for crippled children, in Henry street, the next batch went, and the delight of the youngsters was unrestrained. The children of the Spring street neighborhood house next were visited. Lastly at the skin and cancer hospital, in Second avenue, although many of the recipients were adults, the blossoms caused gladness. Probably a thousand persons in all were made happy by the wedding flowers.

Clerks, porters and bellboys at the Waldorf-Astoria yesterday were singing the praises of Lord Decies. Before departing on his wedding trip, Lord Decies sent two cases of the finest imported French wine to Denon Coleman, head porter, and five dollar gold pieces to ten of the bellboys. He presented to three of the clerks—Albert J. Lazarus, Edward P. Smith and Arthur Stillwell—handsome silk neckties.
