## FIVE NEW RECORDS SET AT U. N. B. SPORTS YESTERDAY

Frederickton, May 30.—Five new records were made this afternoon in the annual University of N. B. sports, the meet being one of the most notable in that respect in history.

Even the record of 10 1/2 seconds for the 100 yards dash, which had stood since made by "Doc" Armstrong of the class of 1913, tied in one of the prettiest races imaginable, both breathing the tape together in 10 2/5 seconds, so that the judges had to declare it a dead heat. Kuhring was the dark horse of the day, winning a total of 17 points, and not only doing his part in breaking the 100 yards dash record, but also putting on new figures for the 120 yards hurdles which he negotiated in 17 1/4 seconds, the old record being 17 2/5 seconds, made by Joe Wood in 1907. He also boosted the record for pole vault from 10 feet 1 1/2 inches made by Weyman, '02 to 10 feet, 2 3/4 inches, '02 being the best, perhaps, the biggest surprise of the day, Binney was hooked upon as a likely record breaker, and his performance was therefore not so much of a surprise. He did his part of the work in putting on new figures for the 100 yards dash, and also reduced his record of 24 1/2 seconds made last year, to 24 seconds flat. The other new record made was for the mile run, in which Melrose, a graduate of the St. John's High school, reduced a record of 7 minutes put on by Landry, '10 to 4 minutes, 54 1/5 seconds. Melrose was in good condition and ran a well timed and excellently judged race, finishing with a fast sprint which showed that he was comparatively fresh.

New records: Foster Howe carried off the honors as individual all-round champion as anticipated with 28 points. Kuhring was second with 17 points and Binney third with 14 points. The freshmen won the class honors with 46 points, the sophomores being second with 38 points.

In the event of the St. John's prizes were presented at the grandstand by Mrs. Jones, wife of Chancellor Jones, to the successful competitors.

The graduating class of 1911 at the university held a dinner at the Queen Hotel tonight. Tomorrow will be taken up largely with social functions and Thursday the formal convocation exercises will be held.
